Warns of Fabrics That Keep Solvent Cleaning Odor

State Health Commissioner Dr. Albert E. Heustis has advised users of coin-operated dry cleaning machines to beware of garments and fabrics which retain a solvent odor after cleaning.

Several incidents have been reported, including one in Michigan involving infants and young children being overcome by fumes from the dry cleaning solvent, perchloroethylene. One automobile accident has been attributed to a driver being affected by the fumes.

Dr. Heustis said that heavy articles, such as drapes, small rugs and some coats are likely to retain the solvent fumes if the machine is not functioning properly.

HE URGED coin-operated dry cleaning machine customers to call for assistance from the attendant, or if they retain a strong odor.

If no one is available to give assistance, caution should be used in handling the articles, he said. Articles that are still damp or retain the odor, should be hung outside to dry and under no circumstances should be placed in a closed automobile or small room.

ABOUT 150 coin-operated dry cleaning establishments are located in Michigan.

The state health department conducts an active program of inspection, such as installations and health department approval is required before the State Fire Marshal will issue an operating license.

The health department also expects some control over which machines are installed in the state, through a testing program of all new equipment.

Of the 35 to 40 different makes of coin-operated dry cleaning machines, only 11 have been approved as meeting performance standards established by the Michigan Department of Health.

Special Female Fish Studied by U-M Expert

University of Michigan researchers are working on a unique zoologic problem — the origin of a strain of semi-tropical fish that produces only female offspring.

A \$13,900 grant has been received from the National Science Foundation to finance a two-year continuation of studies into the reproductive biology and genetics of minnow-sized fish found from Arizona to Columbia.

These fish are unusual also in that they bear their young alive rather than from eggs.

Dr. Robert R. Miller, U-M professor of zoology and curator of fishes in the Museum of Zoology, led expeditions to northwestern Mexico in 1955, 1957, 1959 and 1961 to obtain specimens used in the studies.

OF INTEREST are two fish populations which have, in addition to normal males and females, an unusual, unisexual (single sex) strain.

"In nine laboratory generations, these strains gave birth only to female young," explained Dr. R. Jack Schultz, research associate in the
