## State Fair to Stage Teen-Age Attractions

There'll be fun and action aplenty for teenagers at the Michigan State Fair Aug. 24 through Sept. 3. And the educational side won't be neglected, either.

For many young members of 4-H Clubs, Future Farmers of America and Future Homemakers of America, the State Fair provides the big opportunity of the year for showing off livestock, crops and skills.

This year \$7,500 in prizes will be offered winners in junior show livestock at the State Fair, general manager Walter A. Goodman has announced. Dairy cattle, beef cattle, sheep and swine raised by youngsters ten to 21 years old will compete for premiums and ribbons.

ESPECIALLY for the girls will be the competition in the junior show homemaking department, with exhibitors showing their skill at sewing, canning and baking.

And then there are competitions in educational exhibits, crops and industrial arts, with cash and ribbons going to the young winners.

Music will highlight the fun side of the State Fair for the teenagers. The weekend Coliseum shows are slanted their way, with such stars as Jimmy Dean and the Kingston Trio scheduled to appear. Dean highlights the show the first weekend of the fair, the Kingston Trio the second weekend.

IN THE music shell, teenagers will get a chance to hear the smooth rhythms of their "elders" as Tex Beneke and his "Salute to Glenn Miller" take the stage nightly.

And the State Fair will feature a host of other activities for the teenagers... the "jazz corner" at the Veterans Monument... all in fun of the gray midway educational and industrial exhibits loaded with fascinating information... horse and livestock shows.

It all gets under way Fri., Aug. 24 (a week earlier than usual this year), when Fairgrounds gates open at 6 p.m. A big parade in downtown Detroit at 8 p.m. will herald the opening.

The camp is open to all young people in the Birmingham church who have completed the 11th and 12th grades, and also post-high youth.

Christian Youth Groups in Mature Love will be the theme of the camp. It is a study recommended for groups this age by the United Church of Christ, department of camps and conferences.

THE COURSE attempts to give a christian approach to the special aspects of teenage growth. Formal lectures, followed by small-group discussions, will be included in the program.

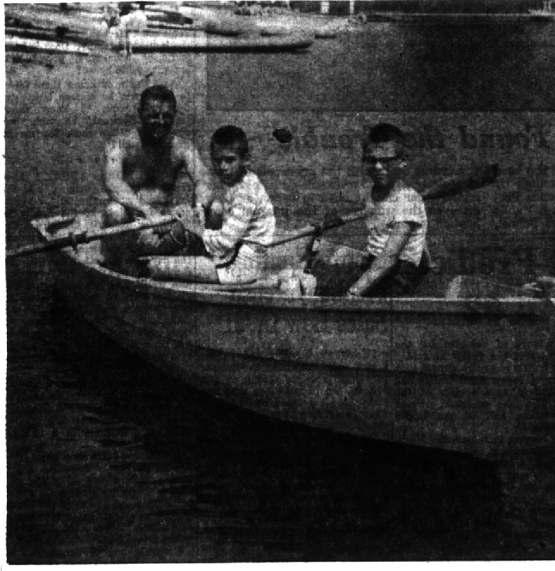
A large group of experts in the field of love, sex and marriage have been assembled to implement the regular staff for the week. A major presentation each morning by one of the experts will be followed by a group discussion supervised by qualified adult leaders.

DURING THESE discussion periods campers will be afforded a chance to raise questions based on the morning's lecture and react to the speaker's statements.

Usual camp recreational activities will round out the week.

SENIOR HIGH camp will be the Detroit Congregational Association's first experience in United Church of Christ camping, in cooperation with the Michigan-Indiana synod of the Evangelical Reformed Church.

It will be directed by the Reverend Mead Bailey and the Rev. Devlin Engelstorf. Included on the counseling staff are Mrs. Mead Bailey, Birmingham; and Mrs. Louise Sturgeon, Orchard Lake.

ham. Its members are among the more than 6,000 Detroit Area Council Scouts who will attend a one or two week camping session at the D-Bar-A Scout Ranch near Metamora, the Charles Howell Scout Reservation at Brighton, or conduct their own independent troop camps throughout the state this summer.

# Oakland County Agencies Aid Archdiocesan Charity Society

Oakland County's Roman Catholic social agencies joined with seven nearby counties last year to provide for more than 54,000 aged, 3,500 youth and 8,500 families.

Also included in the Catholic Charities of the Archdiocese of Detroit are the counties of Wayne, Macomb, Monroe, Lapeer, St. Clair and Lapeer.

The Very Rev. Msgr. W. F. Suedkamp, secretary for Catholic Charities, presented the report to Archbishop John F. Dearden this June.

"A FEW BASIC statistics in the annual report are merely an indication of the overall Catholic social agencies' efforts," said Msgr. Suedkamp.

The annual report also included 186 refugees placed in the community; 386 children placed in adoption; 1,156 children placed in foster care; 6,580 poor families as-

isted financially; 1,227 aged and 2,051 children cared for in institutions; 1,548 youth, given counseling; and 1,529 community house members provided with recreation and other services.

IN ADDITION, some 1,135 un-der mother's received services, and some were provided shelter and counseling service prior to confinement in a maternity hospital.

Youth activities included counseling boys from the detention home, placing children away from their own homes in boarding homes, a school for retarded girls and providing temporary and permanent residence for small children and dependent boys and girls.

FAMILY services include counseling on religious, marital, financial, psychological, and social problems.
