Mrs. Herbert Ashcraft, Jr. of Royal Oak was her matron of honor, and bridesmaids were

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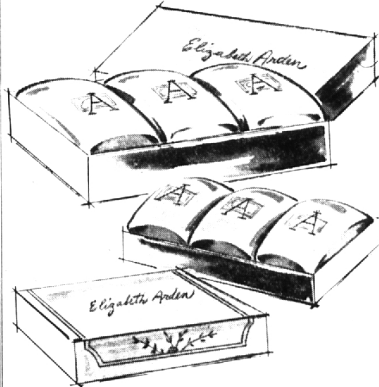
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
