

New Adult Education Courses

A number of new adult education courses will be offered this fall. The new courses include spelling, science, goals for Americans, English grammar, reading improvement, the psychology of the adolescent, creative writing, furniture refinishing, portrait painting, china painting, and safe loading, given in cooperation with the U. S. Coast Guard Auxiliary.

Three Liberal Arts non-credit courses taught by college instructors will be offered in cooperation with Wayne State University and the University of Michigan. They are "Introduction to Music," instructor Dr. Angela Cucci (Wayne State); "Culture of the New World," instructor Allen McPherson (U. of M.); and "Foreign Policy," instructor Russell Barnes, Detroit News.

ABOUT 60 classes will be offered this fall including a variety of art courses; beginning, intermediate and advanced language courses; business courses; a number of homemaking courses; beginning, intermediate and advanced bridge; and ballroom, round and square dancing.

The adult education program of the Birmingham schools is designed to reflect the interests and requests of the community. The department will offer any course where facilities and instruction are available, and in which a minimum of twelve enroll. U-M Professor Says Teachers Must Stimulate

The good teacher should now and then make his students feel downright uneasy, says Glen Rasmussen, associate professor of education at Flint College of The University of Michigan.

"The good teacher creates needs in his students," says Rasmussen in the current issue of "The School of Education Bulletin." "He makes the student want to explore some unfamiliar territory.

"Under the best of circumstances the student is not sure whether his exploration will be successful, or if it is successful, whether or not it will bring about a disturbing change in his life," says Rasmussen.

"IF THE teacher is to stimulate genuine learning, he must contrive a situation which will cause the student some genuine uneasiness so the student will feel urged to seek his own solution.

"However, the student should feel free to approach the teacher for guidance," Rasmussen notes. "The teacher is often seen by a student as the only available person who has the wisdom and willingness to help with some difficulty.

"A teacher even though he is not a trained counselor, is not likely to do serious harm by listening to a student's problem. And while the teacher may often prefer to remain unmoved it may be best for the student to use the teacher as a person who will not bring sanctions to bear."
