

Planning Board Considers Zoning Change Requests

Construction permits totaling \$172,660 were issued in Birmingham during the month of July. The planning board was told at Tuesday's monthly meeting. The July figures brought the total construction figure to \$1,341,405 for the first seven months of 1962.

In other action the planning board:

- Denied a request by Frank Newell to rezone the northeast corner of Maple and Waterfall Lane.
- Denied the rezoning of the northeast corner of Townsend and South-

The planning department felt that since the area was a well-established single-family area, any rezoning to a two-family or multiple-family classification would create an island of high density residential, and could adversely affect the surrounding single-family development.

NEWELL'S REQUEST was turned down by the board because it was felt the proposed change would not be in keeping with the present neighborhood. Newell had sought to build a duplex on the property.

A GROUP representing the Birmingham Parks Improvement Association attended the meeting to protest Newell's request.

The group, which represents 77 property owners in the area, felt that a change in zoning might lead to the lining of Maple with apartment buildings.

A REQUEST by Dr. A. L. McNaughton for rezoning property at Southfield and Townsend to build a dental office was denied until after the planning consultant presents the new Town House zone classification.

OUR SHEPHERD Lutheran Church's request to construct a new parking lot on its property on 14 Mile between Mansfield and Melton was tabled until after the city commission acts on the proposed new parking lot restrictions.

The plan board also recommended that the city sell the youth lot of the property it owns on Lakeside north of Oak and rezone it to an R-1 classification.

It was first believed that the area could be developed into an active recreational area, but the land is not of sufficient size and does not have the physical features to develop it into a neighborhood park.

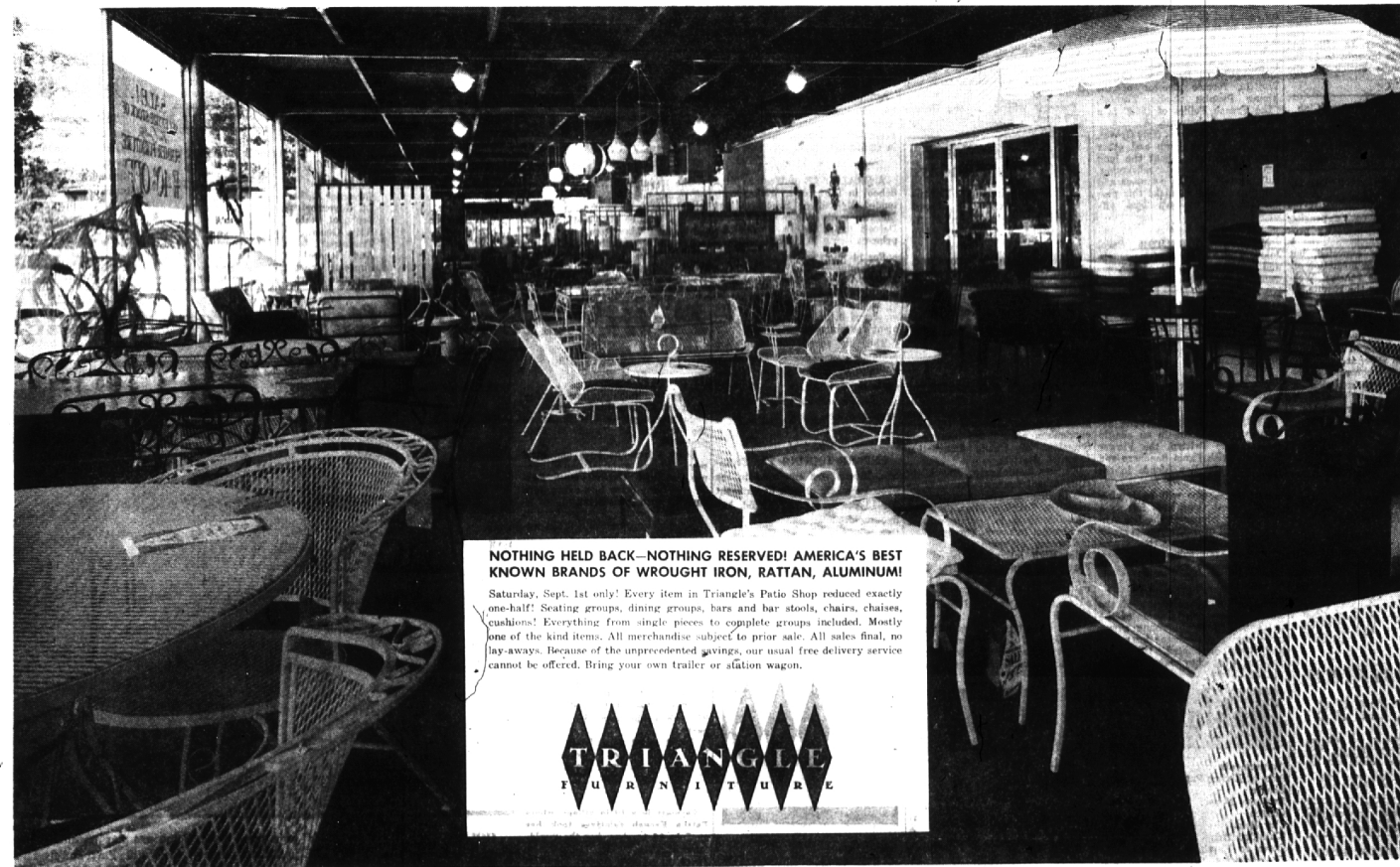
