After the reception, the couple left on a honeymoon thru Canada. They will make their home in East Lansing.



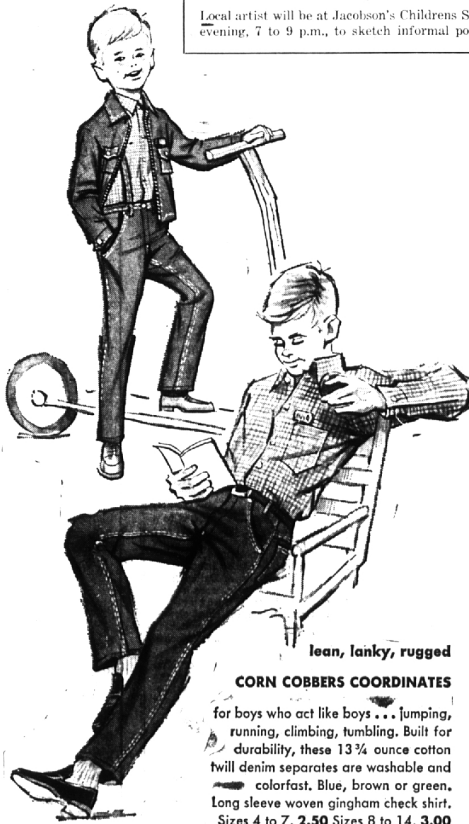
