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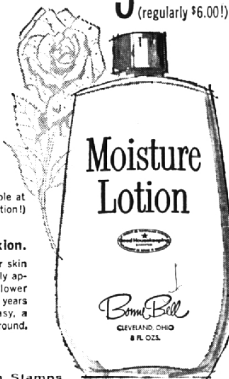
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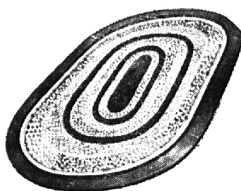
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MRS. WINGARD

Mrs. Barron chose a pastel green, princess style floor-length gown. The groom's mother wore pink lace over taffeta.

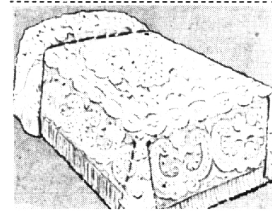
A reception at Glen Oaks Country Club followed the wedding.



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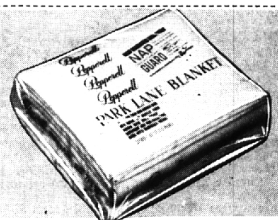
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
