

## MSUO Lists Night Classes

Michigan State University Oakland has announced it will expand its schedule of evening courses for credit this year.

For the first time, it will give high school students the opportunity to take one of these courses for college credit, and, for the first time also, it will offer upperclass work in the evening.

The course open to high school students for advanced placement credit at MSUO will be in economics, the nationally televised College of the Air program, "The American Economy." Several hundred colleges are participating in this program. This course is also open to regularly enrolled MSUO students, as well as to adult evening students.

OTHER FALL TERM courses will be the Development of Western Institutions, English composition, Music, and Finite Mathematics. The last two are new additions to the schedule.

Winter term offerings will be Western Institutions, Western Literature, Political Science, Art, American History, and a junior level economics course, Business Enterprise.

In another move to help evening students working towards a degree, class hours have been lengthened so as to offer two classes a night instead of one. Classes will run from 6:30 to 8:20 and from 8:30 to 10:20 p.m.

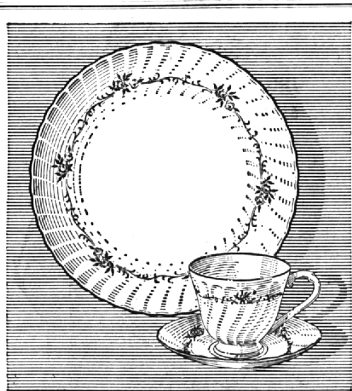

## Plants

MANY OF YOU are familiar with another deadly member of the same family, the "fly" Amanita, Amanita muscaria. It is so named because it kills flies which sip its juices and then lie dead on its bright yellow saucer-like cap which is decorated with white stars.

It likes best to dwell in the deep recesses of pine and spruce forests where it grows to a diameter of six to 10 inches. Its deadly ingredient is muscarine which paralyzes the nerves controlling the action of the heart. The drug atrophin is an antidote if promptly administered.

IT IS TRUE that many people who recognize only one or two species of mushrooms have safely eaten these over the years. It is also true that some mycologists have been victims in spite of their studies.

As a final caution, unless you are an experienced collector, eat only white-fleshed puffballs or morels which grow like small sponges in the spring woods and in old orchards and fence rows. Members of these two families are easily recognized and are perfectly safe for the table.

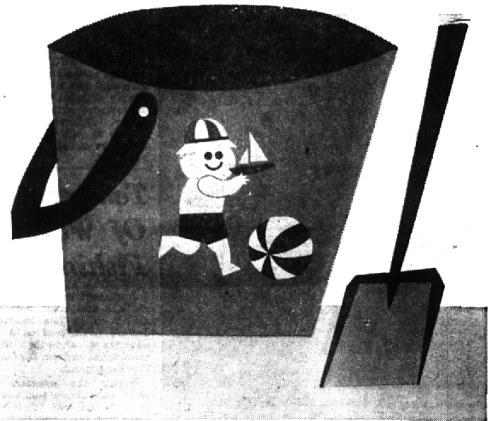
