In addition, Mr. Howlett was chairman of the AAA's national worldwide travel committee and of its safety committee. A Mason, he was a past commander of the Detroit Commandery, Knights Templar, and past master of Corinthian Lodge.

Mr. Howlett was a member of the National Association of Real Estate Boards, Michigan Real Estate Association, United Northwest Detroit Realty Association and the Detroit Real Estate Board.

He was also a trustee of Crittenton General Hospital and a member of the Detroit Athletic Club, Noontide Club, Birmingham High-Twelve Club and Sigma Phi Epsilon Fraternity. A native of Gregory, Mich., he was a 1923 business administration graduate of the University of Michigan.

Surviving are his wife, Doris; daughter, Mrs. Robert A. Barnes; his mother, Mrs. Fred A. Howlett; a sister, Mrs. H. M. Barrett; a brother, Dr. Howard T. Howlett, and four grandchildren.

A Masonic funeral was conducted by Detroit Commandery Knights Templar, Tuesday in Roseland Park Cemetery.

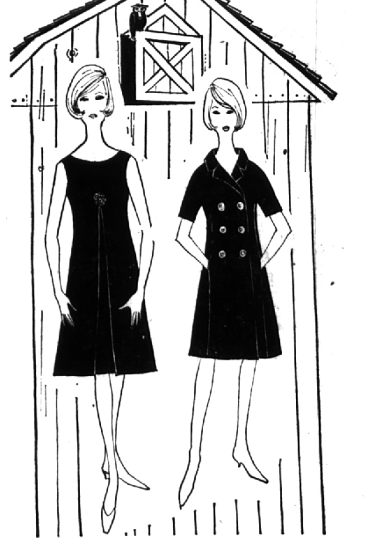
