Dynamic Thursday Group Pegs Volunteer Work 'Rewarding'

Sixteen busy Birmingham women who like to see direct results from that portion of their time set aside for volunteer and community activities find the perfect answer in working at Kinney Cottage at Pontiac State Hospital.

Whether they are called "The Thursday Group," "The Kinney Group" or the "Kommunists" (a Greek word meaning "having something in common") means little to these women who are more interested in what they're doing than in what they're named.

Questioned about what they consider they are giving the patients, the women have many different answers. Mrs. Armstrong: "We bring them music, and they bring it back to us." Mrs. James Keene: "We try to bring them variety, and exposure to current happenings." Mrs. William Slover: "A smile, some fun, a sense of humor." Mrs. Harold R. Heydon sums it up for the whole group: "I don't know what to say so specifically bring them, I only know I don't want to miss a single Thursday. I enjoy it so."

Mrs. McCurry adds that "what they do bring is a stimulating experience for the learn and teaches, helping them learn and re-learn the ways of the outside world."

IN ANY CASE, 9:30 every Thursday morning finds them assembled at Kinney Cottage on the hospital grounds where they provide all sorts of activities for the 120 middle-aged to elderly emotionally ill women who are patients there.

"This group is quite unique, even among our hundreds of volunteers throughout the hospital," says Mrs. Robert McCurry, director of occupational therapy at the hospital. "They seem to adapt so well to the place where they are working."

"I've seen Kinney Cottage before and after," Mrs. McCurry continues. "In the fifteen years I've worked there I've never seen such a change as since these volunteers began to work there three years ago. Even the attendants have a new outlook."

She adds that the Thursday group has much to offer the patients. "Mainly they offer them recreation and work, all with a sense of humor and fun. They also give them social outlet, very important to people who are used to seeing only professional help."

THE THURSDAY GALS are under the direction of Mrs. William H. Armstrong. Probably because each has a different idea of what they bring to the patients, they have a lot of variety to offer. Their program includes music, crafts such as leatherworking, tile work, weaving etc., which are sold at the annual bazaar.

The women also have a pretty-up table with hair-dos, nail care and make up to offer, and they plan many parties—bingo parties, holiday parties and a few unique affairs such as the "Shoppers Spree" they staged last year where they provided each patient
