Madame Rosepettle has fun with her psycho-neurotic preoccupations and author Kopit has a sense of humor. He creates some fantastically funny scenes by juxtaposition of the weird and the worldly.

"Oh Dad, Poor Dad" doesn't just dare to be different. It belts you in the solar plexus with its mould-breaker.
