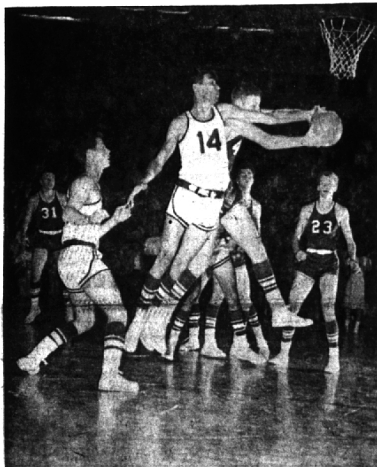

It was a nip-and-tuck game until the final two minutes. Within that short span of time, East Detroit scored five points, Seaholm, none. The final score was Shamrocks, 56, Maples, 50.

With 2:17 left in the game, East Detroit led, 51-50. The Maples took eight consecutive shots and missed them all. From there on out, it was a matter of ball control and shooting free throws for the visitors.

Seaholm jumped off to a 13-11 first quarter lead as big John Slater scored eight points and pretty much cleared the boards. The Maples were unsuccessful in the second period and East Detroit led the court with a 26-22 margin.

SLATER HAD a good night as he picked up 20 points to lead both teams in scoring. Chuck Hutton contributed 10. Dick Williamson had 13 points for the winners.

The Maples rallied in the third quarter and narrowed the gap to 41-40. Hutton controlled the boards during much of this stanza.

THE LOSS LEFT the Seaholm cagers with a 1-1 record for the young season. The game against East Detroit, Eastern Michigan League defending champion, was the first against a league opponent. The team will be away this Friday for a game with Port Huron. The next home game is against Mount Clemens on Jan. 8.

Ski Champion To Hold Clinic At Pine Knob

Stein Eriksen, world-famous ski champion, will conduct a week-long clinic at Pine Knob ski resort, starting Saturday, to certify instructors for the ski school he will operate this season at Pine Knob.

Eriksen said seven consecutive sessions will be held during the evenings, and will be devoted to instruction in his "delayed shoulder" technique.

CANDIDATES FOR teaching certification will be examined by a professional qualifying committee headed by Eriksen, for skiing proficiency, teaching ability and personality.

Positions on the 25-member Pine Knob teaching staff will be filled from among the clinic applicants, Eriksen said. Both men and women instructors will be used.

Maple Crew Sets Six New Records

The Maples took seven first places of eight and set six new records in the Royal Oak Relays at Kimball Saturday and completely outclassed their nearest competitors, Ann Arbor and Grosse Pointe.

Seaholm scored 102 points to only 62 for second-place Ann Arbor, who failed to win any of the events.

GROSSE POINTE, winner of the 200-yard backstroke relay, came in third with 59 points, followed by Royal Oak Kimball with 38.

The exuberant Maple swimmers threw their coach, Corey Van Fleet, into the pool after the meet but the happy mentor didn't seem to mind at all. It was the first time in three years that Seaholm had won the relays.

THE MAPLES proved their versatility as 16 different swimmers participated in the winning events. Don Spencer, Bob Wolf, Dave Zimmerman, Tom Coupe, Dennis Rozema, Tom Fritz, Jack Hoyt, Randy Matthews, Rick Ron Lotero and Jeff Wallace were on winning teams twice.

AMONG THE ENTRIES is Ed Hahn of Detroit, a former national champion in squash. Representing the BAC are Tom Hart and Ted Guething (last year's champion at the club).

The performances are open to the public and ladies are especially invited to see top-notch players in action.

The results of the regional competition will be known in about two weeks.



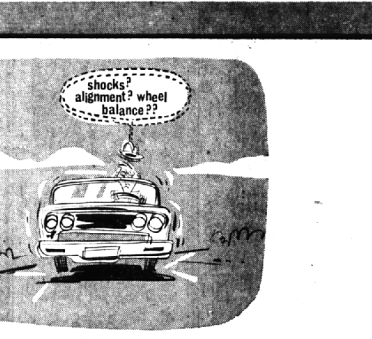
