the image of the loquacious, say, a chap like Jimmy Hoffa. President Kennedy supports Adlai's claim of "no softness"—which the President has to do, if he wants to keep Adlai as our top man in the United Nations. (Wasn't Adlai revealed as one of Kennedy's close advisors in rejecting promised U.S. air power in that Bay of Pigs landing a couple of years ago?)

(Little James Caesar Petrillo once served for 40 years as president of the U.S. Musicians' Union, and did mighty much to increase the compensation of his members. He lives in Chicago, where he also headed up that city's musical union, but recently he got out of tune and lost the Chicago presidency. I once knew a Chicago musician who, 45 years ago, had a small local orchestra, with Jimmy playing a trumpet in it. "Was he a good musician?" I asked. "Well, I honestly must say not very good," he replied. Nevertheless, Jimmy Petrillo may not have known too much about the musical business, but he did get lots of acceptable notes from the pocketbooks of people who buy and sell music.)

You lately have been reading about President Kennedy's efforts to manage news releases. You probably are aware that most of those "long-hairs" around him believe that there is justification in preventing prying reporters from being too curious, too aggressive in searching out news from the federal government. Kennedy et al admit they withheld certain news during the recent Cuban situation; to some degree, in that affair they may have been right. But to continue "secrecy" in many other departments of the Federal Government is tantamount to the pattern of dictatorship. After all, the government of the United States is not a private property of any individual or group. (Kennedy and you to 400 million dollars to the contrary notwithstanding! It belongs to 183 million Americans, who support it in war and in peace, in life and in death!)

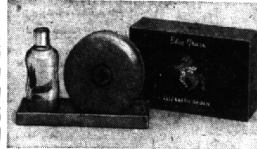

kept by the engineering department. Complete maps of cities, sewers, water mains, paving specifications and general maps of Birmingham are in the department's files.
All information in the department's files are open to the public for inspection. Many maps that the department has may be purchased from the city.

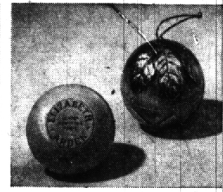

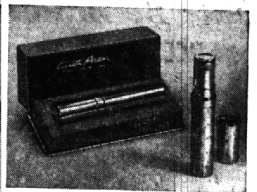
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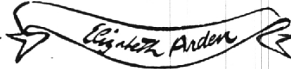
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
