### Knudsen Gives Main Address To Volunteers

More than 550 volunteers from throughout Michigan journeyed to Kellogg Center, East Lansing, Dec. 12 for the annual Campaign Achievement Celebration of the Michigan United Fund.

### Property's Need For Hydrants To Be Reviewed

Birmingham City Manager L. R. Gare has been directed to prepare another report on the necessity of installing a water main and fire hydrants on 2.74 acres of property on Eton Road.

At a public hearing Monday, the city commission determined that there was no necessity to assess the property owners for the \$5,000 cost of construction.

Erb Restrict Lumber Co. is negotiating with the Grand Trunk Western Railroad for purchase of the property. Also included in the deal are a freight office and freight house.

REPRESENTATIVES of both the railroad and the lumber firm felt that the new hydrants were not necessary. Erb Restrict is seeking the land because its present space is not adequate.

In Gare's report Monday he said, the city administration felt that additional hydrants on the property were needed for fire protection.

Commissioner Carl P. Ingraham said that he had "no doubt" that the hydrants were needed. In view of the fact that "no precedence had been set in the municipality, there was justification for the city to install the hydrants.

Ingraham contended that the city as a whole would benefit from the installation of the hydrants and not just the property owners.

Commissioner William H. Hurst said that he believed there was a possibility of installing the hydrants at other locations in the area and thus make use of water mains already in existence and at a considerable savings to the city.

classical piano training under the late Dr. Maurice Garabrant, internationally known organist and choir master at Christ Church Cranbrook, Bloomfield Hills.

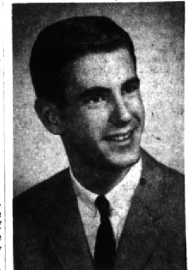
Beginning at the age of six, he has maintained an interest in piano for 12 years, further enriching his training for the past three years with the study of organ music.

### 4 Men Face Jury Trial in Levy Holdup

A jury has been selected and trial is proceeding in the circuit court trial of four men who are charged with kidnaping, armed robbery and robbery of a safe in the attempted holdup of J. J. Levy, Royal Oak businessman, Sept. 4, 5.

Facing a jury trial are Joseph Loncar, 35, Thomas J. Kubala, 26, and James E. Wilson, 27, all of Lincoln Park, and Joseph J. Welsh, 38, of Hazel Park.

BEVERLY HILLS police arrested Loncar after pursuing the car in which he and Joseph Rossetti, 35, of Philadelphia, fled through the village. After chasing the car for several miles, the police forced them to a halt on the Farmington expressway. Rossetti was found dead in the car by the Beverly police.

### 6-Lane Highway Plans For Area Completed

The State Highway Department today announced completion of an engineering study for the modernization of 2.5 miles of M-24 (Square Lake Rd.) in Bloomfield Township.

The study is co-ordinated with the Pontiac Highway Plan. The \$2.5 million project calls for construction of a six-lane divided highway and four bridges between US-10 and I-75 at the southeast limits of Pontiac.

It will replace an existing three-lane pavement. From Telegraph Road (US-24) east to Woodward Avenue (US-10 BR) and a two-lane pavement. From Woodward Avenue to Opdyke Road at the Pontiac city limits.

The entire route is now taxed to capacity.

TRAFFIC STUDIES predict a traffic flow of more than 1700 vehicles per hour when the new highway is built to provide a cross connection between US-24, US-10 and the I-75 freeway.

To accommodate the expected increase in traffic, the study recommends the construction of median barriers on M-24 and the acquisition of access rights to the highway between Telegraph Road and Woodward Avenue.

Existing streets leading to subdivisions in this area will remain open, with the exception of Devon

Road, which will be relocated into Lahser Road.

Additional right of way and access rights are to be acquired on the north side of M-24 from west of Lahser Road to east of Opdyke Road to permit construction of a new three-lane highway to carry westbound traffic.

A NEW BRIDGE will be constructed to carry the westbound lanes over the Grand Trunk railroad track at the Pontiac city limit. Eastbound traffic will be carried by the present bridge, which will be modernized.

All roads leading to subdivision properties in the area between Lahser and Opdyke Roads will remain open, except Marlborough Drive, which will be closed.

Two new bridges will carry the new highway over Opdyke Road to an I-75 connection now under contract.

Approximately 115 properties will be affected by the proposed construction program, some by total acquisition, the remainder by only partial acquisition or severance from the highway.
