Today's hand—also from this competition—will display the top defense.

Mr. Goren several years ago named the play that defeated the contract in today's hand as the "uppercute." He and Helen Sobel together displayed just how the "uppercute" may be of great value.

The bidding: East 2 ♠, South 2 ♠, West 3 ♠, North 3 ♠, East 3 ♠, South 3 ♠, West 3 ♠, North 3 ♠.

Opening lead: K ♠. The bidding and the final contract were quite normal, but it was the defense that differed.

After winning the opening lead of the king of clubs, Mrs. Sobel continued with the ace. Her third lead was the jack of clubs.

Goren saw the queen of clubs drop on the second trick and knew he was expected to execute the "uppercute," and like the good partner that he is, he co-operated and played the king of hearts. This play enabled them to win two club tricks, two in the trump and one spade, to defeat the contract and win a top board.

An only sorry to report that this pair did not do as well on the other boards and therefore did not earn the right to represent the United States in this competition.

event, as Jones makes it, becomes contrived giving the author his chance to say, "See this is what happens when men fight men," or "See, we are not yet out of the trees."

JONES TELLS the reader his message so often, each character's restatement of it is reflected in his personality, each event embroiders the pattern finally making the author's message unbelievable for the context in which it is presented.

However, Jones can be such an excellent story teller, and is in many places of this book, that the reader will find it a difficult task to lay aside the "Thin Red Line" once it is begun.

The author's style of prose construction and short, uneven sentence rhythms produces an immediacy found only in the texts of American novelists. A shift of setting and sometimes character within a given paragraph is usually quite effective for portraying reality as it exists in contrapuntal, incomplete snatches of thoughts and events. The fact that the reader seldom loses the thread of meaning during these unorthodox sentence and paragraph constructions attests to the craftsmanship of James Jones.

IF A READER is searching for the entertainment an action story provides, if mental stimulation is a criterion for exceptional reading, then such a searcher can pause to read "The Thin Red Line." While Jones may not convince or persuade a reader with his philosophy, he will provide an exciting and often terribly true story of men in war.

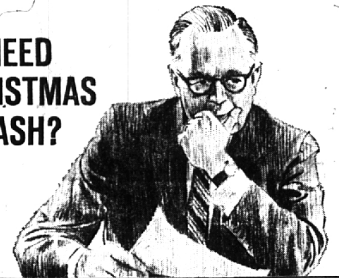
