Claire Coci, internationally acclaimed woman organ virtuoso, will be the next artist to appear in St. James Episcopal Church's Concert Series.

Miss Coci's recital is scheduled for 8:15 p.m. Feb. 6 at St. James Church.

Among Miss Coci's presentations will be Tocatta by Fortner, Adagio by Andriessen, Tocatta by Stravinsky, Faucant by Sowerby and Sonata on the Ninety-Fourth Psalm by Beakle. A reception in the church undercroft will follow the program.

HER RISE to eminence among organists of the world has been rapid. She has performed with major symphony orchestras, given recitals from coast to coast and was the first woman organist to be invited to perform at West Point.

Following work at the University of Michigan and travel and study in Europe, Miss Coci became a member of the faculty of the famous Oberlin Conservatory of Music in Oberlin, Ohio. Later she became associated with the Westminster Choir College of Princeton, N. J.

At present she is one of the accredited teachers of the Union Theological Seminary, New York, and heads the organ department at the Dalzerose School of Music.

AT THE AGE of 16 Miss Coci was offered the position of chief organist in a large church in New Orleans. When this youngster walked into the choir loft to take charge, the paid choir quit—walked out in a body. Here was a sixteen year old girl with no choir at all, faced with the responsibilities of conducting the musical portion of the service.

With imagination and the personal charm that have characterized Miss Coci's career, she appealed to the congregation and recruited a volunteer choir, which in a few months time consisted of fifty voices—many more than the church had ever had. She introduced organ solos into the church, organized the library, created and

Magazine Accepts Dr. Grey's Article 'Parish Ministry'

Dr. Alfred D. Grey, minister emeritus of Pine Hill Congregational Church, recently received word that his article on "The Parish Ministry" has been accepted for publication in Pastoral Psychology, an interdenominational magazine for Protestant clergy.

The article represents a summary of a series of his lectures given at the Convocation of Congregational Ministers of Michigan in 1959. It deals with techniques of routine and specialized parish visitation and calling and their relationship to and impact on personal counseling.

EMPHASIZED Dr. Grey's insistence on parish calling as a prerequisite to personal counseling.

A minister for over 47 years, he believes no clergyman can be successful unless he diligently strives to acquaint himself with individual parish members, thereby capturing their trust and confidence for dealing with their spiritual, intellectual and personal problems.

Dr. Grey, who founded Pine Hill Congregational Church in 1906 (retired Jan. 1 for reasons of health).

Dr. and Mrs. Grey left last Thursday for a three-month vacation in Palm Springs and Laguna Beach, Calif.
