OTHER resources being used to inspire the artists are the 75th Anniversary Issue Birmingham Eccentric 1878-1953, and "Know Your Area."

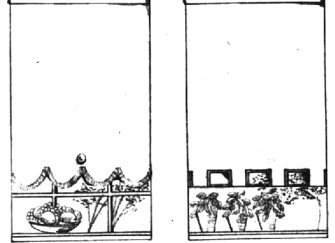
### Panel Discussion
