Seminar on Alcoholism Opens at MSUO Feb. 12
An eight-week Seminar on Alcoholism designed specifically for people who work professionally with alcoholics, will begin Feb. 12 at Michigan State University and as a pilot project of the Michigan State Board of Alcoholism.
Sponsored by the state board, the university's division of continuing education and the Citizens' Alcoholism Advisory Committee of Pontiac, sessions will deal with social, physiological and psychiatric aspects of alcoholism.
A grant to MSUO from the State Board of Alcoholism has covered the planning and will cover part of the operation costs of the seminar, the first one of its kind in Michigan.
DR. JUNE M. COLLINS, assistant professor sociology and anthropology at the university, will direct the seminar and lead the first two sessions. At the first meeting of the group she will define the alcoholic and discuss the prevalence of alcoholism in the United States and in Michigan in particular. The following week she will cover the social characteristics of alcoholics. The bodily effects will be discussed in a lecture, "Physiology of Alcoholism," by Dr. James M. Orten, professor of physiological chemistry at Wayne State University, on Feb. 26.
Future topics and dates will be: Mar. 5, Psychiatric Aspects of Alcoholism; Mar. 12, The Alcoholic and His Church; and The Alcoholic and the Attorney; Mar. 19, Alcoholism and Law Enforcement; Mar. 26, The Community Power Structure and Programs for Treatment of Alcoholics; and, April 2, Community Services Available for Alcoholics.
