

B'field Township Gives Annual Report on Fires

BLOOMFIELD TOWNSHIP—Of the \$90,492 loss some \$55,861 Township fire fighters this week completed the annual report for 1961.

According to the report, presented by Fire Chief Volly Yanuszski, the Bloomfield Township fire department went out on 419 runs during the year.

THE LARGEST number of calls was 118 for grass fires. There were 75 in-habitator runs, 56 smoke investigations, 37 car fires, 30 electric appliance fires, 28 house fires, 19 false alarms and 4 fires in commercial buildings.

A total of \$90,492 was tallied in fire loss with \$11,697,940 worth of property and contents endangered by fire, the report said.

THE FIRE department traveled 31,497 miles and fought fires for 244 hours and 34 minutes. The department has 16 regular men and 88 in the reserve force.

The peak period for work in '61 was between 1 and 4 p.m.

COMPARED TO 1960, the township fire department noted an increase in grass fires, in-habitator runs and smoke investigations. There was a decrease in house fires and electric appliance fires.

The total loss was up about \$25,000 as well as an increase of about 23 hours spent fighting fires.

Tomorrow afternoon Barnum takes on Brother Rice at 4 p.m. on the Rice home floor.

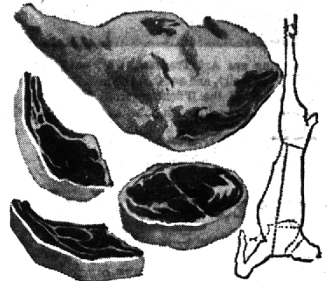

Southfield Township Tax Deadline Over; Penalty in Effect

SOUTHFIELD TOWNSHIP—Township residents—Bingham, Beverly and Franklin villages—can still pay township taxes at the Township Hall, 18500 W. 13 Mile Road.

During February, the office hours will be from 8 a.m. to 8 p.m. Monday, 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Tuesday through Friday and from 8 a.m. to noon on Saturday.

THE DEADLINE for tax payment was Jan. 19. Since Jan. 20 a four per cent penalty has been added.

After March 1, an additional 10 per cent per month will be included and taxes will have to be paid at the Oakland County Treasurer's Office.
