promotional campaigns of book publishers. "Publishers are not interested in turning out good books but in good book jackets," he said.

To become a classic, a book must meet certain qualifications. "It must be old—at least 30 years and survive its own generation."

"It must start out slowly—like a race horse—but get to the finish line first."

"IN SHORT a classic is a literary leech. It will 'stick' around, refuse to die or let people ignore it," he said.

Dr. Miles left his audience with some simple rules to follow in how to judge a classic.

"It must show extraordinary artistic competence and a unique personal style," he said.

"It must have great depth of emotion."

"It must be filled with a universal insight," he stated. A classic he explained should deal with problems that concern us or our fellowmen. The reader should come away a wiser person after reading it.

"Lastly the classic should have a unique personal idiom."

The style of the author should be such that readers will know the writer's name without having to see it or the title page.

City Receives Motor Bank as DBT Valentine

Birmingham received a unique Valentine Tuesday from the Detroit Bank and Trust Co. in the form of the area's first complete motor bank.

Formal opening of the bank was highlighted by Mayor Florence H. Willeit driving a Lincoln Futura "idea car" through a huge paper heart at the new bank's location at Woodland and Oakland.

"Just as the hand-built Futura 'idea car' of the Ford Motor Co. symbolizes the automobile of the future," said Raymond T. Perring, DBT's president, "so the new 'idea bank' expresses the latest ideas of modern banking design and customer service technique."

PRESENTATION of a heart-shaped box of Valentine candy to Mayor Willeit by Perring marked the opening of week-long Valentine celebration at all four Birmingham DBT offices.

The \$200,000 motor bank project was designed by O'Dell, Hewlett and Luchenback and built by Chi-sue Construction Co., both of Birmingham. The bank, first in southeastern Michigan, is completely heated electrically, was designed with an unusual use of cast-in-place concrete, which flares out from upright columns to serve as canopies over customers' cars.

The plant consists of four separate building units connected below ground by a 60-foot-long passageway. Each unit has its own driveway approach to serve drive-in customers.

THE MOTOR BANK was developed especially to provide drive-in service for the customers of the two downtown Birmingham DBT offices, which do not have drive-in windows.

Opening of the new Birmingham office eliminated a year-long one-million-dollar office expansion program.

"We are at Detroit Bank and Trust," said Perring, "sincerely hope that this contemporary new drive-in bank will win the hearts of all the customers who will use it. We also hope that it will be the forerunner of many new and modern banking concepts of the future that will do much to make banking at Detroit Bank and Trust even more convenient and pleasant than it is today."
