LAST WEEK, Mr. Valter Poole, associate director of the Detroit Symphony Orchestra, opened the second series of Humanities lectures at Cranbrook during the 1961-62 year.

This series deals with music and Mr. Poole presented his material under the topic heading, "The World of Music."

HE BEGAN BY saying, "The world of music is as wide as the world of life itself," and then proceeded to explain how music played a large part in each person's life. Briefly he explained how to better appreciate music, how to derive more worth from listening to it

and from participating in playing or singing it.

In modern times, music is especially important as a means of relaxing tensions caused by what Mr. Poole termed, "the strain of the industrial age."

He pointed out that although music, as a cultivated art, is the newest of the arts, it "runs the gauntlet of every human emotion."

IN CLOSING he indicated the potential of music as a common language capable of transcending barriers of race, color, or nationality; a medium able to contain the savage beast in men. The final phrase of his prepared speech was a tribute to the greatness and significance of music. He said, "Self-expression is one of the greatest experiences in life."

A discussion period followed during which Mr. Poole spoke further about expression, inter-communication, jazz and good taste.
