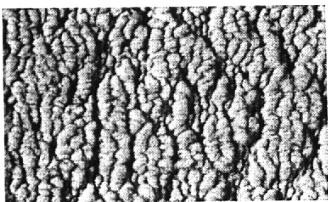
BAA Exhibition Has Five Top Photographers

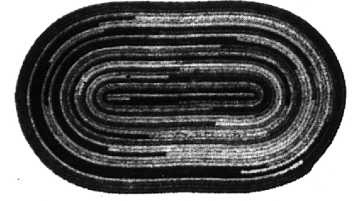

Yamamoto and Eero Saarinen, Georges is the interpreter of Edward Stone's work, while Hedrich, of the pioneer architectural photography firm of Hedrich-Blessing, has captured the beauty of buildings by Mrs. van der Rohe and Frank Lloyd Wright.

Wives of prominent Detroit area architects will be hostesses at an opening reception from 7 to 9 p.m. Monday, through March 17. Korab and his wife, Monica, are exhibition co-chairmen.

"IT IS MY strong belief," said Korab, "that photography is a viable art."

"While an architectural photographer satisfies a purpose of representing the building or model, he invariably puts something of himself in the picture. The degree of his own personality is the picture's qualifying as an artistic work."

"The spectator himself is the judge," Korab believes. "Artistry depends on the picture making a stronger impact on the spectator than a straight illustration."

"HUNGARIAN by birth, 36-year-old Korab came to Michigan in 1955 from France, where he studied architecture. He joined the Birmingham firm of Eero Saarinen and Associates as an architect.

He turned to architectural photography in 1957. Since that time his photographs have appeared in important national and international publications and on the covers of professional magazines. Though he has gained recognition as one of the top architectural photographers in the United States, Korab has never had a lesson in photography. The Korabs live at 165 N. Woodward, Birmingham.

CO-CHAIRMEN for the exhibition's opening day reception are Mrs. Hugh Acton and Mrs. Robert A. Thom. Hostesses will be Mrs. Gunnar Birkerts, Mrs. Louis Redstone and Mrs. Glen Paulsen.

Troy's First 'Y' Program Opens Today

Dates for the beginning of the first YMCA program in the Troy area were announced this week.

The extension board of the recently-organized Troy branch of the Detroit Metropolitan YMCA set today for the start of a weekly adult gym night.

They scheduled the opening of a Saturday fun club Feb. 24 for fourth through sixth grade children. The board also announced plans for a fifth grade boys' basketball league to begin Feb. 24.

THE ADULT gym night will be held each Thursday from 7:30 to 9 p.m. at Baker Junior High School. Open to men and women over 18, it will offer half court basketball, volleyball, tennis and tumbling. Registrations will be accepted at the school on opening night.

The weekly fun club is offered at Johnson-Niles, Leonard and Morse Elementary Schools, from 9:30 to 11 a.m. Adult leaders will supervise activities which include games, gymnasium, crafts, movies and stories. Groups will be limited to 60.

Registrations will be accepted in all school principal's offices or at fun club opening sessions.

BOYS MAY register for basketball leagues in the offices of their elementary school principals.

Other YMCA programs for families, youths and adults in the City of Troy will be developed as community demand is indicated, according to Boyd Larson, Assistant Superintendent of Troy schools. Larson is chairman of the 15-member Troy Extension Board.

Larson said the board welcomes suggestions about activities residents would like to have scheduled. They may be sent to P.O. Box 2, Troy, or telephoned to William H. Beck at the Birmingham YMCA. Beck is extension secretary for the new branch and a member of the staff of the Birmingham Y headquarters for Troy organizational activities.

THE TROY Extension Board is currently waging its first membership campaign, through Feb. 19. Through sale of memberships, the board hopes to reach its future goals. They include a full-time professional YMCA secretary, a full family program and a building for activities and programs.

Attending Seaborn under the American Field Service program are Peter Hezel, 17, of Bruck-Mur, Austria, who is residing with the Robert Saunders, 210 Waddington, and Gunilla Wennerber, 18, of Karlshamn, Sweden, who is living with the Howard Candolds, 466 Wellesley.

STUDYING AT Seaborn under the Michigan Council of Churches program are Retrad Briesenick, 18, of Berlin, Germany, who is staying with the Marvin Brokaws, 1165 S. Bates, and Christoph Hoffmann, 18, of Dortmund, Germany, who is residing with the Charles Morab, 2849 Ballinebrook.

The fifth student, Hans Kupper, 17, of Solothurn, Switzerland, is at Groves under the AFS program, and lives with the Warren Risks, 1840 Warwick, Beverly Hills.

The presentation of the keys to the city is a follow-up to the city commission's welcome extended early in October. The foreign students will remain in Birmingham until July 1.

IN ADDITION to their school work, the students are making speeches on their countries and their impressions of the United States for various community organizations.

This year marks Groves' first participation in the foreign student program. Next year the school hopes to have two students under the AFS program.

Seaborn has participated in the AFS program for seven years and the MCC for two years.

Audubon Society Plans Field Trip And Wildlife Film

The Detroit Audubon Society is presenting an all-color motion picture "Once Around the Sun" illustrating a swing through space on the spinning planet, Earth.

William Ferguson eminent naturalist, will present this film Saturday at 7 and 9 p.m. in Detroit's Rackham Memorial Auditorium.

Ferguson, a naturalist and cartoonist, originated "This Curious World," an educational cartoon which is syndicated to hundreds of newspapers in the United States and Canada by the NEA service. Combining qualities of artist and wildlife expert, he produces programs which are educational, entertaining, and informative.

"Once Around the Sun" begins at the stroke of midnight on New Year's Eve and follows the gradual month by month change of the seasons in a dozen states. It illustrates the close association with all the furred and feathered creatures that share the planet earth. Plants and flowers also add their seasonal brilliance.

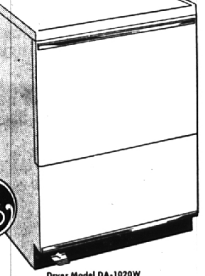
