Franklin Village Players appear to be getting off the ground with their spring production "Ladies of the Jury," under the experienced

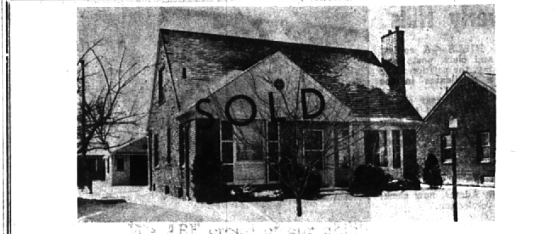
direction of Don Odle. Troutts held last week produced a promising cast of 22 who will be seen at the Farmington Players Barn late in March.

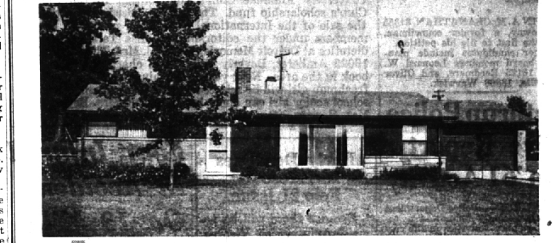

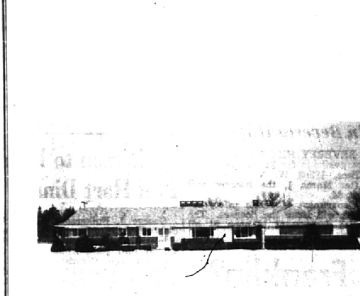

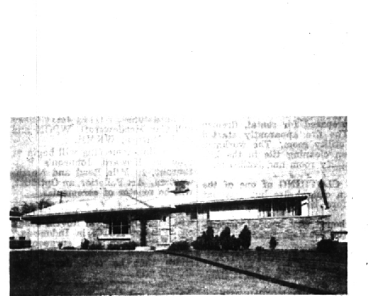
