

Maples Down Groves; Records Fall

The inclement weather outside had no effect on the red hot Seaholm tank team, Tuesday, as they downed inter-city rival Groves, 65-40.

Over 700 fans jammed into the Maple pool to watch some of the most thrilling dual meets in either team's history.

The victory was the 13th in a row for the Seaholm squad.

Chris Jones, the groves were all honored again and another tied in the meet.

LEE DRIVER of Groves, broke his brother Bob's record in the breaststroke with a time of 1:06.7. The older Driver's record was set by Bob in 1960 when he swam for Seaholm.

All-American Don Spencer set a pool and school record as he won the individual medley for Seaholm in 2:15. Spencer clipped 1.2 seconds off the old mark. The flashy Maple junior also tied his own record in the butterfly with a winning time of 58.8.

The Maple medley relay team of Bob Wolfe, Jim Bradburn, Tom

Fritz and Tom Coupe established a pool mark of 1:47.9 in taking that event.

Lynn Smith started the Maples on the winning trail with a victory in the 400 yd freestyle. Smith was clocked in 4:37.4.

BOB SUTTON evened the wins up for Groves as he touched a

winner in the 50 yd. freestyle in 24.5 seconds.

Spencer then came through with his record-tieing performance in the butterfly to boost Seaholm out in front to stay.

Jim Falconer came up with his best time this year in winning the 200 yd. freestyle for Groves. He was timed in 2:03.4.

Diving honors went to Maple star Ken Heft with 186.0 points. Tiny Greg Geiger of Groves finished in the second spot as he nosed out teammate Ron Farnson.

Tom Coupe took the honors for Seaholm in the 100 yd. freestyle with a winning time of 84.5.

Dick Leahy and Ron Lotero finished.

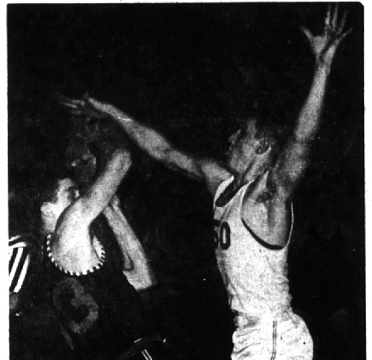
Tomorrow Derby takes on the Barnum Trojans, 4 p.m., at Barnum.

Loons Take Lead In BAC Bowling

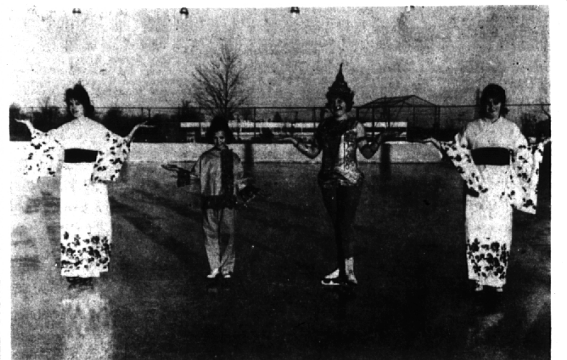
The Loons took over sole possession of first place in the Birmingham Athletic Club bowling league last week with a 15-5 record.
