Cite Gossett As Possible AG Candidate

William T. Gossett of Bloomfield Hills, who resigned as Ford Motor Co.'s general counsel last week, is being mentioned as a possible candidate for state attorney general.

According to automobile industry and political sources, Gossett is being considered for the attorney general nomination on a Republican ticket to be headed by George Romney of Bloomfield Hills.

Gossett, 57, of 420 Goodhue, who resigned to devote more of his time to activities of a public service nature, has not definitely committed himself but has admitted that he is "not disinterested in becoming a candidate."

HOWEVER, HE insists that he would not be a self-starter and would not enter the race unless invited to do so by Republican leaders. Thus far, he has not been approached on the subject by Romney or party leaders.

Gossett is a son-in-law of the late Chief Justice Charles Evans Hughes, who was an unsuccessful Republican candidate for President in 1916.

The nominee for attorney general is selected by a party convention in which the gubernatorial candidate exercises considerable influence.
