Reuther, Yntema To Lecture Here

Walter Reuther, president of the UAW-CIO, and Theodore O. Yntema, finance expert of Ford Motor Co., will speak at the 12th Annual Franklin Memorial Lecture Series during March and April at Wayne State University.

"New Horizons of Economic Progress" is the theme according to Dr. Lawrence H. Seltzer, Franklin lecturer for 1962. Seltzer is professor of economics at WSU. Opening the series on March 26, will be Dr. Paul A. Samuelson, consultant to President John F. Kennedy.

Samuelson, professor of economics at Massachusetts Institute of Technology, is president of the American Economic Association. His topic: "Policy Problems—Easy and Hard."

Reuther will speak on April 2 on "Priorities for Freedom's Survival." On April 9, Dr. Herbert A. Simon of Carnegie Institute of Technology will discuss "Decision Making as an Economic Resource." Yntema, chairman of the finance committee of Ford Motor Co., was vice-president of finance from 1949 to 1961. His topic on April 16 will be "U.S. Education: A Backward Industry?"

FINAL LECTURER and holder of the Franklin chair, Seltzer will speak on "The U. S. and the Common Market." He has been an economist or economic consultant with various agencies for many years.

All lectures will be held in the Community Arts Auditorium at 8:30 p.m.

"... ON THE FACE of it, on the basis of meager reports made available by our supervisors, I believe we have some reason to believe the supervisors were rather prejudiced," said Renfrew.

"I just don't understand the rush," he declared, referring to the fact that supervisors received the aviation committee's report one week ahead of the first step of a \$50 million project the next week.

"I would like to know, were our other supervisors (other than Ingraham, who had informed the commissioners he was unable to stand at this time on the airport project) asked Renfrew.

"I should like to see a canvass of them to know what their reaction was."

"I SHOULD like to be heard in my own mind that the board of supervisors are a little better educated on this than the information to date indicates."

Renfrew said he would "like to see the commission express itself with caution, certainly with considerably more caution than they approached us on the first step."

INGRAHAM EXPLAINED that the supervisors' action was based on the so-called 1959 Landrum-Brown report on a survey of airport needs of the entire, six-county metropolitan area.

That report recommended development of a second metropolitan airport within 10 to 15 years and that it be located north of Pontiac to serve Oakland, Macomb and northern Wayne counties.

Studies had indicated that it was not feasible to develop the Pontiac municipal airport as a metropolitan project, Ingraham said.

The Aviation Committee, he explained, felt that if there was to be a major airport in the county it should be governmental rather than private initiative and that it be under control of Oakland County.

Ingraham, saying that he was unable to answer all of the commission's questions, said he had arranged for Rowan to attend a commission meeting to explain the project if his colleagues so desire. There was no comment.

IN HIS LETTER to Mayor Willett, dated Feb. 15, Levinson said the Aviation Committee had enlisted the aid of a special Industrial Committee, which advanced funds to pay for land options for the desired property in Pontiac and Orion townships.

James M. Robbins, president of the Jim Robbins Co. of Royal Oak and Troy, was chairman of this committee. Merritt B. Hill, a Ford Motor Co. vice president and a Birmingham resident, was one of the committee members.

IN HIS FEEL to report to the board of supervisors, Rowan said the Aviation Committee found it necessary "to avoid publicity" because of the problems involved in securing options on the properties needed to form the nucleus for the airport.

"Therefore," he said, "we have been unable to make advance reports to the members of the Board on our plans."
