Jon Capron of Troy has been appointed to serve as area division chairman in the Rochester Unit, Crittenton General Hospital Building Fund Campaign.

Announcement of the appointment was made by Howard L. McGregor, Jr., general campaign chairman.

"The area division which Capron heads, will be the largest division in the campaign both in territory and number of prospective donors," said McGregor. "I feel confident McGregor, that we are indeed fortunate in having a man so well acquainted in and with the area to head this division."

The Area Division will contact all individuals, exclusive of residents of municipalities with the City of Troy the sole exception, in the following townships: Oakland, Avon, Washington, Shelby, Orion and Sterling, with the exception of those individuals and firms that will be contacted through the Memorial Gifts and Industrial Division.

"BECAUSE OF THE widespread desire of residents in the Macomb-Oakland area to have adequate hospital facilities available here, where they live, when needed, we will have the largest recruitment of volunteers ever organized in the Oakland-Macomb area for a community project."

Together with his wife Helen and four children Capron lives at 5105 Willowgrove in Troy.

Cranbrook to Show Art by Students From Tokyo School

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Southfield Bank Proposed; B'ham Man May Head

A Birmingham man is being considered for the presidency of a proposed Bank of Southfield, now awaiting official chartering from the Michigan Banking Commission.

Edward Rusig, 35, has been with the Federal Reserve Bank for 10 years. With him in the forming group are Orland Ellis of Franklin and William Henry, William Booth, Lloyd Gahler, Charles Cash and Dr. Milton Lapping, all of Southfield. Others are Southfield

Councilman Alexander Perinoff and William Bruner of Detroit.

THE PROPOSED bank is to be at Lahser and 11-Mile Roads and will be about 2400 square feet on the main floor. A basement below it will be about 1500 square feet. Ellis said both this bank and another one as proposed the Southfield Bank are awaiting approval. He said he believed only one charter would be granted although it is possible the commissioner will consider or refuse both banks.

THE MEN listed as incorporators of the proposed Bank of Southfield will be the nucleus of the organization but won't hold controlling interests, Ellis said. Some of the stock will be sold publicly, according to Ellis.

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Speaker Calls Petroleum Bill 'Strait Jacket'

Jerry Vanek, Public Relations Manager for Standard Oil of Michigan, Monday told members of the Birmingham Club that the petroleum industry would literally be placed in a strait jacket if a proposed bill in the Michigan Legislature, regulating the price of gasoline and plant the industry under some utility-type control, should become law.

Vanek said the Gasoline Dealers Association of Michigan has announced it was sponsoring such a bill which soon will be introduced in Lansing. Vanek told the Hi-12 members, "undoubtedly such a bill would mean higher gasoline prices when the competitive forces which have kept the prices low are eliminated."

He said his company and other oil companies generally do not believe in turning to government regulation of prices as the answer to the recent price wars that have been going on in the metropolitan Detroit area.

"SEVERY ATTEMPT made in the United States or Canada," Vanek said, "where planned government controlled economy has been tried, has either resulted in keeping the most inefficient producer in business or has ultimately cost the consumer an added premium for its operation and administration."

"The control of the oil business has never been tried in the United States. If the number of service stations is arbitrarily limited, if the oil industry has utility controls fastened to it, then the oil business in Michigan will be in a strait jacket," Vanek said. "The consumer will inevitably pay higher and higher prices for lesser and lesser values."

While Vanek said he was asking Birmingham thought leaders and business men to help the oil industry counter these very grave threats, on our free competitive system, also he was asking that they act in their own interests as well.

"IF THE HIGHLY competitive oil industry can be put in this strait jacket," Vanek asked, "how long do you think it will be before they are measuring your business for one too?"
