

12 Communities Join In Franklin Blood Bank

FRANKLIN—Twelve neighboring communities join Franklin residents to make a big deposit for the blood bank on March 2. Volunteer recruiters from Bingham Farms, Walnut Lake, Foxcroft, Franklin Knolls, Wing Lake-Franklin Woods, Meadow Lake-Maple Woods, Franklin Valley, Westgate, Holly Hills, Wood Creek Farms, Westbrook-Kendallwood and Glen Oaks have been calling prospective donors. Appointments are being made for 2 till 8 p.m. at the Franklin Community Church.

Centrally located for this grouping of communities, the Franklin Community Church offered its facilities to the mobile unit of the Red Cross on March 2 and makes no claim on the pints of blood donated there.

Diabetes patients and persons with active allergies are ineligible. Also, those who have received transfusions of blood within the past 12 months or who have been pregnant within the past year.

Others who cannot donate are persons with a history of jaundice or infections, hepatitis less than six months previously. And, those with tattoos less than six months old.

THE "PEOPLE Helping People" program has brought life saving blood and blood derivatives free when and where needed and is supported solely by voluntary contributions.

The Red Cross maintains the highest standards for blood collection and processing and the procedure is practically painless. No blood is ever accepted for donation if it may be in any way harmful to the donor or the recipient of the blood. In fact, all the blood is tested and typed in a Red Cross laboratory before distribution, to insure maximum safety.

ANYONE BETWEEN the ages of 18 and 60 years of age can give. Providing, of course, they have not given blood within the past eight weeks and weigh over 110 pounds.

Proposed Lathrup Solicitation Law Drafted by Hayes

LATHRUP—A solicitation control ordinance, in first draft form, will be discussed at the next council meeting, council members decided Monday. The rough draft was prepared by City Attorney Everett Hayes.

The proposed ordinance is aimed at controlling solicitation not already covered by the so-called "handbill" and "food handling" ordinances. The new ordinance would allow solicitation by church, religious and charitable organizations.

MRS. LAURENE JENKINS, safety chairman of the Southfield PTA Council, appeared regarding a recent PTA council request for action to control selling by ice cream peddlers. The matter was referred two weeks ago to Lathrup Police Chief Tom Telfesen.

Telfesen reported that the peddlers do not create a problem locally and noted that the food handlers ordinance regulates them in respect to health and sanitation.

HE ALSO NOTED that a section of the city traffic code banning parking on Lathrup streets for the principal purpose of selling, except under proper authorization and in the proper places.

Council members agreed that such peddling could best be controlled by enforcement of local ordinances.

Get Dog Licenses Early, Stone Tells Lathrup Residents

LATHRUP—Local dog-owners may alert themselves if they intend for their pets at a bargain price of \$2.25 before the March 1 deadline. City Administrator Jerald Stone reported at Monday's council meeting.

The fee after that date will be \$4.25, Stone said.

The city has been commended by the Deputy Director, Oakland County Department of Health, because 76 per cent of the dogs in the city have been vaccinated and licensed.

Stone said the city would probably conduct a house-to-house survey to encourage licensing and vaccination. He said cost of such a survey would be covered by fees paid by owners of dogs who are not licensed.
