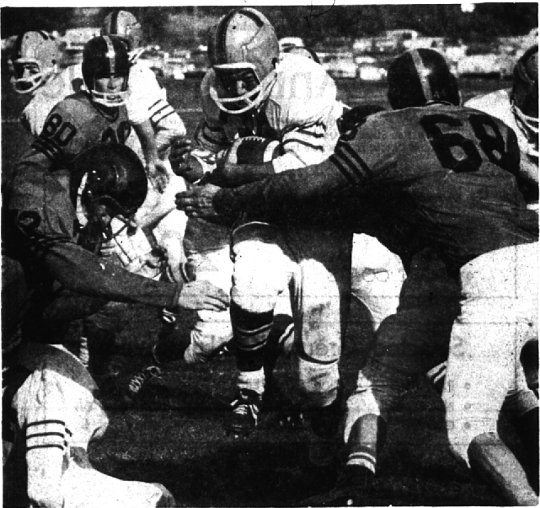
Retail Merchants Division Officers

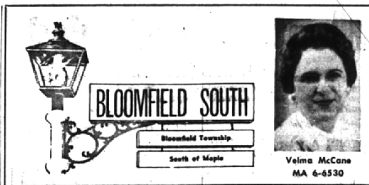
Learning's Lonely, Means Discipline, Professor Writes

Learning is not a social activity—it's a lonely business, and the greater the learning, the greater the loneliness. So states Frank O. Copley, University of Michigan professor of Latin in his book, "The American High School and the Talented Student," published by the U of M Press.

"LEARNING IS full of repetition, dull re-remembering, monotonous checking and rechecking of details. It demands discipline. It requires endless memorization, for the learner will never have time for a final step to understanding if he must be forever running to his reference books," writes the professor.

"We have no right as teachers," he says, "to let our students—and above all our best students—imagine that learning is or can be anything else than all of this."

THE COURSE IN critical thinking, dull re-remembering, monotonous checking and rechecking of details, and a promise of education reward greater than that to be gained is.
