Elliott to Be Speaker At Meeting of League

Delegate Arthur G. Elliott, Jr., chairman of the Local Government Committee of the Constitutional Convention, will be featured speaker at the evening session of the annual meeting of Region IV of the Michigan Municipal League at Pleasant Ridge on Jan. 11.

Attending will be mayors, presidents, councilmen, and other elected and appointed officials from League member cities and villages in Macomb, Oakland and Genesee Counties.

Region IV program will open

with a general session, moderated by Village President Clayton Fraser of Rushing, and featuring a talk by State Tax Commission Chairman Robert A. Eckhardt, who will discuss the political aspects of the Commission relative to assessment, equalization and appeal procedures.

A panel session on cooperative action in solution of municipal problems will follow. This session, moderated by Mayor William A. Shaw of Warren, will include discussion of intergovernmental cooperation in providing sewer, water, garbage and rubbish disposal systems, and will explore the potential areas in which such cooperative action can further improve services to taxpayers.

Panel participants will be Daniel W. Barry, Oakland County Drain Commissioner; Donald C. Egbert, Mayor, Southeast Oakland County Water Authority; Paul Foxworthy, City Manager, Pleasant Ridge; and David E. Fritson, City Manager, Troy.

The afternoon program will close with a discussion of "Municipal Trust Liability," in which Louis C. Andrews, Jr., League staff attorney, will speak on the question of municipal liability and liability insurance, with emphasis upon the effect of the recent Michigan Supreme Court decision in the Williams case.

Commentary will be added by William Ewart, City Attorney from Pontiac; the moderator will be Mayor James N. Callahan of Mount Morris.

New regional officers will be elected in the business session at the evening session. Present Region IV officers are Wendell E. Norris, Mayor, Pleasant Ridge, and William Young, Mayor, Swartz Creek.

Regional officers serve as a liaison between League headquarters and its regional member municipalities, and play a great part in helping member officials realize and make use of League services. Representing 423 member cities and villages in Michigan, the Michigan Municipal League serves to unite members in collectively striving for home rule and to promote higher standards of municipal government.

Seek Agreement On Interceptor

Municipal and Oakland County officials will meet at 10 a.m. Jan. 12 in Royal Oak to discuss a proposed agreement for the construction of an interceptor.

Birmingham City Manager L. R. Gave, City Finance Director James H. Purkiss and Commissioners Charles W. Renner and Ralph J. Smith are expected to attend the meeting at the Twelve Town Drain office, 317 E. 11 Mile Road.

Officials from the municipalities comprising the Southeastern Oakland County Sewage District System will meet to work out details of the agreement.

MSU Offers Philosophy Class To Area Adults

An informal course in existentialist philosophy will be offered in Birmingham this winter by Michigan State University.

Teaching the course will be Dr. Harold T. Walsh of the MSU department of philosophy. The eight class sessions will meet 8-10 p.m. Wednesdays in a 6-hour high school building, beginning Jan. 10.

PARTICIPANTS will trace the history of the existentialist movement, its philosophical framework and the nature of the philosophy as developed by its leading disciples.

The course is offered under the auspices of the MSU liberal arts adult education program in cooperation with the Birmingham Public Schools.

DB&T Increases Interest Rate to 4

The Detroit Bank and Trust Co. recently announced an increase of its interest rate to four per cent. Three Accounts: The new higher rate became effective Jan. 1, 1962, as permitted under reserve rulings by the Federal Reserve Board and the Federal Deposit Insurance Corp.

Designed for longer-term investment, Detroit Bank and Trust's new "Special Thrift Accounts" will have minimum deposits of \$100 and, in accordance with Federal regulations, funds must remain on deposit for at least a year to earn the higher rate.

The announcement was made jointly by Joseph M. Dodge, chairman, and Raymond T. Ferring, president.

Business Population Gains in Suburban Area

Today Willard S. Garrison, district manager of the Detroit office of Dun & Bradstreet, Inc., announced requests for a financial statement were mailed to 44,246 business concerns in Oakland, Macomb and Wayne counties.

Garrison noted the total for 1961, when compared with previous years, shows a continued emigration to and growth in the suburban business community at the expense of the city of Detroit.

Excluding Detroit, the area's business population jumped from 8,756 in 1947 to 18,200 in 1961. During the same period Detroit declined from 28,025 to 25,046.

In business population, Oakland County led with 7,354 listed businesses against 6,492 for Wayne (except Detroit) and 4,354 in Macomb county. Oakland increased to its 1961 listing from 3,949 listed

business in 1947.

Birmingham showed an increase to 455 from 1947 listing of 279; Bloomfield Hills jumped from 11 to 54; Franklin from 8 to 23; Lathrup from zero to nine; Orchard Lake from 5 to 32; Southfield from zero to 450 and Troy from 7 to 175.

The figures obtained from a physical count of the Dun and Bradstreet Reference Book include wholesalers, retailers and manufacturers but not service or professional business such as banks, brokers, beauty and barber shop operators.
