12 Town Drain Work Started!

Construction of the Twelve Town Drain is under way. Work on the long-awaited drain in South Oakland County finally got started last week. First dirt was turned at Ardmore and Wanda streets in Ferris. Completion of the \$39.9 million storm relief drain is scheduled for 23 months from now.

The drain, consisting of 43 miles of sewer pipe, will carry off storm water during heavy rain and empty it into the Red Run Drain, which empties into Lake St. Clair. In dry spells the Twelve Town Drain will carry sanitary flow into the Detroit Sewer System for treatment.

ALTHOUGH NAMED the Twelve Town, the drain actually will serve 14 communities, including Birmingham and Beverly Hills in this area. It has been more than 10 years in planning, due mainly to various forms of litigation.

Construction of a companion project, the Dequindre Sanitary Sewer from Troy to Detroit, is expected to start in February and take 18 months to complete. Cost is estimated at \$6 million.

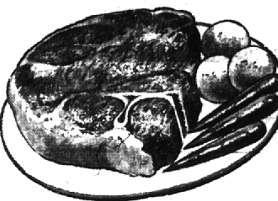

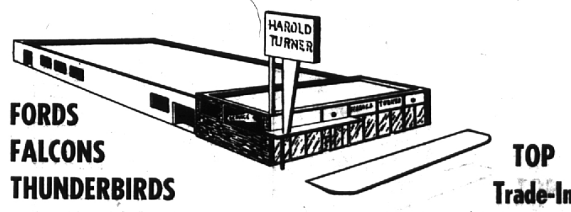
