

Suggest Appointment Of Swim Safety Group

Appointment of a commission on swimming safety to combat the problem of non-boating deaths is to be recommended to Gov. John B. Swainson following an informal meeting of water safety experts at East Lansing State Police headquarters.

Emphasizing the seriousness of the problem, Col. William Carter, State Police water safety officer, told the group that 160 persons had drowned in the state this year in non-boating mishaps. This is more than half or 65 per cent of the year's water death total of 226.

CHAIRMAN OF THE meeting, Alex Canja, administrative assistant to the superintendent, department of public instruction, was authorized to submit the committee's recommendation to the governor.

In addition to Carter and Canja, others attending were Charles D. Harris, chief, field operations, parks and recreation division; Harold B. Guillaume, assistant to Harris; and Russell Patterson, region three director in supervisor, all from the conservation department.
