### President's Advisor To Open MSUO Series

Chester A. Bowles, President Kennedy's special advisor on African, Asian, and Latin American affairs, will be guest speaker at Michigan State University Oakland Jan. 16.

Presented by the University's Foundation Scholarship Committee, the series on world affairs. His topic will be "Perspectives in Current World Affairs".

The program, scheduled for 8 p.m., will be held at the University's Oakland Center. A reception honoring Mr. Bowles will precede the lecture. Members of the Executive Committee of the MSUO and Foundation, faculty members and their wives, or husbands, and the scholarship committee members and husbands, and members of student government will be guests at the reception.

A PRESS CONFERENCE is scheduled for 7:30 p.m.

Bowles was born in Springfield, Mass. in 1901 and was graduated from Yale University in 1924. He is married and the father of five children. He and his family have their home in Essex, Conn.

Bowles began his public service career as a Connecticut delegate to the National Democratic Party Convention in 1940. In 1942, he was named rationing administrator for his home state and from there

rose to national director of Office of Price Administration in 1943.

HE HELD several federal offices under President Truman before being elected governor of Connecticut in 1949. After a two-year term he was appointed ambassador to India and Nepal from 1953-56.

Since that time he has been a lecturer at several eastern colleges, served as a trustee in numerous national foundations and has written six books.

Bowles was named under-secretary of state when the Kennedy administration took over in 1961 and recently figured in a reshuffle of state department positions.

THE BOWLES' lecture is the first in a series of six being offered by the MSUO Foundation Scholarship Committee. The other five will be presented on alternate Monday mornings, beginning Jan. 22, and will feature four professors from the University.

Dr. Jose Rola-Bennett, deputy director, Department of Trusteeship, United Nations, will conclude the series, speaking on the United Nations and Latin American Programs at 10 a.m., March 26.

### AMC OPPOSES CANDIDACY

## Republican Leader 'Finds' GOP Support for Romney

George Romney has been told by American Motors Corp. directors that they wish him not to run for governor in 1962.

But a Republican legislative leader has said he found considerable support among Republican legislators for Romney.

Romney, 54, a Bloomfield Hills resident and president of American Motors, has said he will announce his decision by Feb. 10.

Rep. Allison Green, House majority leader, said last week that he has discussed the possibility of Romney's candidacy with nearly half of the GOP members of both the House and Senate.

He said the great majority of them said they would support Romney if he ran for governor.

Their enthusiasm, Green stated, ran from strong to mild. He said he found almost none who said they would not back Romney.

THE AUTHOR executive told newsmen that the corporation's board of directors made its feelings known at a Dec. 18 meeting in New York. He had called the meeting himself.

He said he felt the directors "should know I was considering running and that I had not made a decision."

The directors, he added, "certainly were not telling me to run. As a matter of fact, they made it very clear that they would prefer me not to run."

Romney is Oakland County's delegate-at-large to the Constitutional Convention in Lansing.

He is a vice president of Con-Con and has assumed a major leadership role in the convention.

He also is state chairman of Citizens for Michigan.

Generally, Romney has been considered a strong contender for the Republican nomination if he decides to make the race.

### B'field Youth Shot in New Orleans

Lawrence Weiss, 19, of 835 Bardonia, Bloomfield Hills, was shot in New Orleans Sunday.

Weiss, who is a student at Tulane University, was shot in the abdomen by Leo B. Selden, Jr., 38, a teacher at the New Orleans branch of Louisiana State University, according to New Orleans police.

The youth was reported to be in "satisfactory" condition in Baptist Hospital.

HE IS THE son of Arthur C. Weiss, former general manager of the Detroit News.

Police said Weiss and another Tulane student, Randolph Reynolds, 20, of Richmond, Va., met Selden in a French Quarter bar early Sunday.

The students are reported to have accepted Selden's invitation to accompany him to his home.

POLICE ACCUSED the youths of beating Selden, robbing him and forcing him to surrender his car keys after arriving at the apartment.

Among the stolen items was a .38-caliber automatic which the youths used to force Selden to enter the car with them, according to police.

Selden broke away and entered the house, said police.

Police said Weiss followed Selden and was shot with a .45 caliber automatic as he met Selden in the doorway.

SLEDEN HELD Weiss until police arrived and Reynolds was later arrested at the Tulane dormitory.

Selden was arrested for possession of pornographic pictures.

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
