mingham drew an outburst of sarcastic laughter. ONE MAN, who explained he had rehabilitated three houses in that area at considerable expense, said "I don't think it's fair to tear down the value of that property." "I realize that business has to go forward," said one woman, "but they should be paid for it." An old-timer commented that he would get away from the rubble of bulldozing in 1936 to get away from it, but it's been growing and spreading since then. Board member Charles B. Kass added a final note to the discussion with the suggestion that the residents' feelings on the proposed rezoning would be reflected in the board's consideration of the matter.

"IN THE SHORT TIME I have been here," said Kass, "I have yet to see a neighborhood so unimpaired as this one." Kass made it clear that the planning board can only recommend action, and that the final decision lies with the city commission. The commission room divided to discuss the rezoning. The rezoning was tabled for further study.

ANOTHER less extensive debate ensued from a second public hearing, on a proposed replat of an 11-acre tract of land on the corner of Woodward and Woodland. Paul T. Healy of 404 Harmon, accompanied by his attorney, objected to a city modified replat of the area proposed by Builders Aten and Mason who are interested in constructing a development of 55 \$20,000 to \$25,000 homes north of Healy's property.

Aten and Mason are considering purchasing the necessary property from R. M. Heizer, 322 N. 42nd, and Mrs. Vinton P. Birch, 210 Harmon. Construction of a street, it seems, would make Healy's property a corner lot, and with abutting interior residential lots (which is what the replat would provide if it is approved) requires the house on the corner lot to be set back from the street a distance equal to the front yard set-back of the abutting interior residential lots.

With approval of the replat, according to Healy, the ordinance would require a house set back 25 feet, leaving him 15 feet short. THE ISSUE HAS been before the Board of Zoning Appeals but was returned to the planning board since the former has no jurisdiction unless a building permit has been requested. This matter was also tabled for further consideration by a quorum of the board. One rezoning question on two other rezoning questions pending further study.

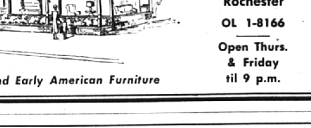
