Franklin, was elected delegate to the Oakland County Council of Republican Women's Clubs.

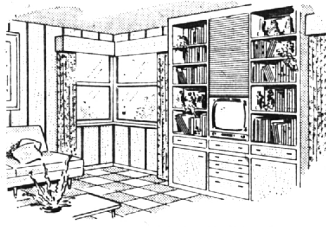
