Mayor Huber, Clarence Long In Troy Race

Troy voters in the coming election will find at least two of the same names on the ballot as in 1959 when they made their choice for mayor this April.

Mayor Robert J. Huber will again be opposed by Clarence F. Long, 56, who finished second in the previous race. Long's candidacy was first announced by William White, 54, of Big Beaver Road, who has announced his candidacy for one of the two commission seats.

ALSO SEEKING re-election are Commissioners Vincent J. McAvoy and Wallace B. Hudson.

Long had earlier backed Albert H. Warner, Michigan Bell Telephone Co. official, who withdrew from the race because of ill health. Long's candidacy had been rumored since Warner withdrew his name.

WHITE, like Troy politics and a manufacturer's representative, said that Long will be backed to some extent by the city's Civil Defense organization. Foes of Long complained of the CD unit mixing in politics last year.

Hal Newhouse Reports on Work Of Foundation

A total of \$32,912.81 in New March of Dimes funds was expended by The National Foundation for the Blind in 1961. The patient aid for 187 residents in Oakland County who were victims of birth defects, arthritis and polio. In addition, \$32,115.27 is still owing by the Chapter for patient care during 1961.

The total amount of patient aid expended from 1961 through 1961 in the Birmingham-Bloomfield area has amounted to \$66,507.02. This report was made today by Hal Newhouse, director of the 1962 New March of Dimes campaign and Arthur Lake, Birmingham area chairman.

Despite the declining incidence of polio since the advent of Salk vaccine, a total of \$5,426.50 was needed for patient aid for seven polio victims in the area including money spent on respiratory equipment in 1961. In addition, there are 20 inactive cases in the Birmingham-Bloomfield area who are eligible for assistance should they need it.

"With large numbers of Americans still unprotected by an anti-polio vaccine there will still be polio victims and the costs are often far more than the average family can stand. The National Foundation is using its long experience in fighting polio to attack two additional disabling diseases, birth defects and arthritis," the director said.

LEGAL NOTICE

VILLAGE OF BINGHAM FARMS, COUNTY OF OAKLAND, MICHIGAN

A special meeting of the Village of Bingham Farms Council was held on Monday, January 15, 1962, at the home of Haskell Wright at 3179 Telegraph Road at 8:00 o'clock P.M. Present: Councilmen, Blocker, Green, Wright, Johnston, Morse, and Wright. Absent: None. The following resolution was offered by Councilman Morse and supported by Councilmen Blocker and Wright:

"Section 1. That the Village of Bingham Farms, Michigan, subject to the voters of the Village, do hereby submit to the voters of the Village at the next regular election the following proposal: That Chapter 11 of the Charter of the Village of Bingham Farms be amended to read as follows:

"CHAPTER XIV
 (Section 1. Public lighting and water systems or supplies shall not be constructed, provided or maintained unless the proposed lighting, water system or system shall first have been approved by three-fifths (3/5ths) of the voters of the Village at any general election or at any special election called for that purpose. Section 2. That the Village Council determine that the whole, or any part, of the cost of the acquisition, construction, replacement or improvement of any sewer or drain or facilities for the disposal of sewage or drain water shall be defrayed by the payment of special assessments especially levied, and the procedure therefor shall be as provided by general ordinance.

"That Section 11 of Chapter IX of the Charter of the Village of Bingham Farms be amended to read as follows:

"Section 11. The Council, subject to the applicable provisions of law, may authorize the borrowing of money in anticipation of such special assessment bonds shall be issued by the special assessment district and a general obligation bond shall be issued by the Village on each special assessment roll, to the extent that the same are used for the payment of the principal of and interest on bonds issued in the manner provided in the ordinance and shall be set apart in a separate fund for the payment of the principal and interest and shall be used for other purposes.

"This resolution shall be published in full in the Birmingham-Bloomfield area newspaper of general circulation in the Village and shall be on file on the table for thirty (30) days before any action is taken thereon.

"All resolutions and parts of resolutions, hereafter as they conflict with the provisions of this resolution be, and the same hereby are rescinded.
