City to Consult Schools On Dance Law Situation

Clarification—that's what Birmingham city commissioners want before making a determination on the confused public dances—dance school situation.

The City has a law requiring permits and fees for public dances and for the operation of dance schools.

But to date, no one has been enforcing the law.

Monday night, commissioners decided to change the ordinance in one respect at least—to require that applications for permits for public dances be made through the city administration rather than through the nominator.

Before making a determination on dancing schools, they want City Manager I. B. Givens to conduct a study to determine whether it would have to obtain permits for dances and dancing classes taught at the Community House.

possibility of studying our present state constitution in light of changing social and economic conditions of the past half century and of recommending such revisions as will benefit the people and the state in the light of modern circumstances and of the new challenges of the next 50 years.

"THIS CALL was a clear, direct appeal for sound constitutional revision. The local government committees' 14-to-11 vote Friday that any county home rule section of the new constitution must be a big step backward, in that it sets an important precedent for restriction, and in the committee's obstinate refusal to urban community residents who desire new modes of local government which are fully responsive to present day governmental requirements."

Arthur G. Elliott Jr., of Pleasant Ridge, chairman of the Con-Con's local government committee, and County Republican Party, Monday denied the charge that his committee "rubber stamped" the old 1908 constitution.

Elliott, Republican delegate from Oakland's 11th District, said the 14-11 vote was tentative and a final recommendation to go to the full convention on the question had not been reached.

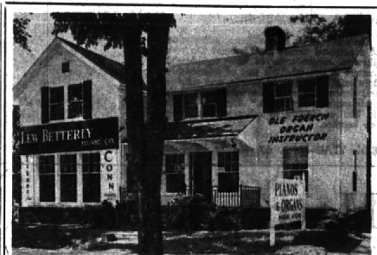
today," the actor said. "It would be a better world if they did."
