

Protestants Ask \$15,250,811 for '62 Overseas Aid

NEW YORK—A total of \$15,250,811 is being set aside for the 1962 United Appeal of Protestant Churches in America for support of their world-wide programs of assistance to hungry, homeless and destitute people overseas.

This goal—an increase of nearly \$500,000 over 1961—was announced at Church World Service offices which sponsors the United Appeal in the interest of its member communions.

Funds realized through the United Appeal will support both individual denominational programs of assistance and cooperative projects carried on overseas through Church World Service and related interdenominational organizations.

HIGHLIGHTS of the 1962 United Appeal will be the One Great Hour of Sharing observance on Sunday, April 1, at which special services will be held in thousands of American churches, with offerings dedicated to overseas ministries.

More than 94,000 individual contributions—the total of the donor nations and communions combined—will be involved in the 1962 One Great Hour of Sharing, the fourteenth annual concerted appeal for American denominations working together to relieve suffering abroad.

A recent designation of One Great Hour of Sharing by the Methodist and Episcopal Churches as their primary overseas aid appeal, and this effort representative of approximately two-thirds of all American Protestant congregations.

THE OVERSEAS ministries made possible by the United Appeal embrace both relief efforts in emergency situations springing from natural disasters—floods, fires, earthquakes, etc.—and in continuing services of material aid among the poverty-stricken and underprivileged, programs of education and self-help assistance and ministries of recreation and rehabilitation among the refugee millions of the world.

Included in the 1962 overseas effort is the SOS (Share Our Surplus) program under which foods from 1.8 surplus stocks—wheat, milk, wheat, flour, corn meal, bulk (or wheat derivative), oils and shortening, etc.—are distributed free to hungry people.

More than 325 million pounds of such excess commodities are scheduled for distribution in 1962 through the SOS program. Value of these SOS foods will be approximately \$25 million.

ALSO ENDED is the program of CROP (the Christian Rural Overseas Program) through which food and many other not available among government donated supplies—are collected throughout the world and utilized in the emergency relief and feeding programs abroad.

Assistance to orphanages and hospitals, tuberculosis and other health projects, the teaching of modern agricultural methods and other new skills and the development of new or more profitable vocations—thus increasing the standard of living and providing vital segments of the world-wide ministry.

IN COMMENTING UPON the need for donors, Mrs. Martin noted that this is the final opportunity within the next three months for residents of the area to donate locally, and without cost, as a service to a local neighbor or to help the American Red Cross.

St. Andrew Launches \$350,000 Building Project

THE ENTIRE church plant, which also calls for a main sanctuary, fellowship hall and parking area on an 8 1/2 acre parcel of land, is expected to be completed within three to five years.

Architects for the project are church specialists Harold H. Fisher & Associates of Detroit.

St. Andrew's congregation, which numbers about 340, began meeting in the Bloomfield Village school in January, 1957. In May of 1957, the church was organized, and in June, the Rev. John A. Root was called as pastor.

THERE IS NO doubt about the need or the desire for a new church, said Pastor Root. "The next two years will be the most significant in the history of our congregation."

The congregation is currently meeting for 9:30 and 11 a.m. worship services and 9:30 a.m. church school in the St. Andrew house chapel adjacent to the building site at 6255 Telegraph. The church will retain its parsonage at 160 Pleasant, Birmingham.
