Fleishman, President of the Archives of American Art, who will speak on "A Collector's Point of View".

Mr. Fleishman has just been appointed by Mrs. John F. Kennedy to serve on an 11-member committee to select American paintings for the White House. He also serves under Edward R. Murrow as a member of the Advisory Committee on Cultural Information of the United States Information Agency.

AS A SOLDIER during World War II he spent his leaves seeing the art collections in the countries where he was stationed. He also has had a term of study at Oxford University.

Mr. Fleishman began collecting art in a serious way in 1948. He has specialized in American art of all periods, and his collection in the early American field is conceded to be one of the finest anywhere. His are interests have taken him to many parts of the globe.
