Mayor Proclaims Boy Scout Week

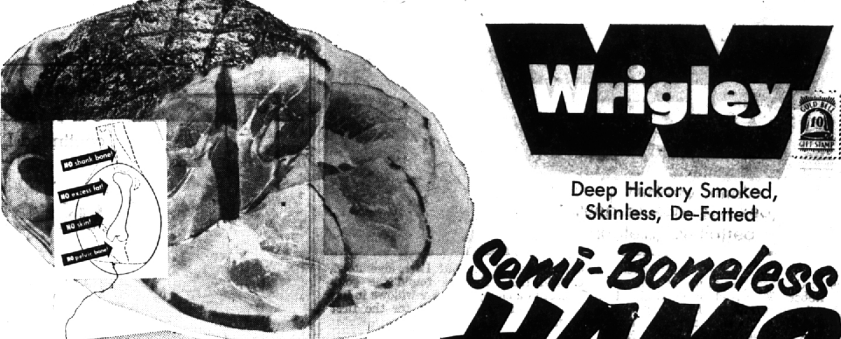
