Mrs. Donald L. Dawson, cookie chairman Birmingham district, says there will be five kinds of cookies available and deliveries will be made March 16 through March 26, 1962.

**PROFITS** from cookie sales provide a portion of operating and maintenance costs at Camp Narrin and a portion of the operating expenses of South Oakland and Girl Scout Council.

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## OFFICIAL NOTICE OF SALE \$2,500,000

### SCHOOL DISTRICT OF THE CITY OF BIRMINGHAM OAKLAND COUNTY, MICHIGAN BUILDING AND SITE BONDS, SERIES 1962

Sealed bids for the purchase of "Building and Site Bonds, Series 1962," to be issued by the School District of the City of Birmingham, Oakland County, Michigan, of the aggregate par value of \$2,500,000, will be received by the undersigned, at the office of the Board of Education, corner of Chester and Martin Streets, Birmingham, Michigan, until 6:00 o'clock P.M., Eastern Standard Time, on Monday, the 5th day of February, 1962, at which time and place said bids will be publicly opened and read.

The said bonds will be dated as of February 1, 1962, will be coupon bonds in the denomination of \$1,000 each, will be numbered consecutively in the direct order of their maturity from 1 upwards, will bear interest from their date at a rate or rates not exceeding 5% per annum, payable semi-annually on December 1 and June 1, and will mature on June 1 in years and principal amounts as follows: \$35,000 in the year 1965, \$75,000 in each of the years 1966 thru 1968, \$80,000 in each of the years 1969 thru 1971, \$100,000 in each of the years 1972 and 1973, \$110,000 in each of the years 1974 thru 1976, \$120,000 in each of the years 1977 thru 1979, \$130,000 in each of the years 1980 thru 1983, and \$140,000 in each of the years 1984 thru 1987. Each bid shall state the annual interest rate or rates upon which it is submitted, expressed in multiples of 1/8 of 1%. The interest for each coupon period on any one bond shall be at one rate only and shall be represented by one coupon only. Accrued interest to date of delivery of such bonds must be paid by the purchaser at the time of delivery.

Bonds maturing in the years 1980 thru 1987 will be subject to redemption by the school district prior to maturity, in inverse numerical order, on any one or more interest payment dates on and after June 1, 1975, at par and accrued interest plus a premium on each bond in accordance with the following schedule:

- \$25 if called to be redeemed on or after June 1, 1975 but prior to June 1, 1977
- \$20 if called to be redeemed on or after June 1, 1977 but prior to June 1, 1979
- \$15 if called to be redeemed on or after June 1, 1979 but prior to June 1, 1981
- \$10 if called to be redeemed on or after June 1, 1981 but prior to June 1, 1983
- \$5 if called to be redeemed on or after June 1, 1983.

Notice of redemption shall be published not less than 30 days prior to the date fixed for redemption, at least once in a newspaper or publication circulated in the City of Detroit, Michigan, which carries as a part of its regular service, notices of the sale of municipal bonds.

The remaining bonds will not be subject to redemption prior to maturity. Both principal and interest will be payable at such bank or trust company as shall be designated by the original purchaser of the bonds. A paying agent may also be so designated.

The said bonds are to be a part of a total issue of \$4,915,000 approved by the electors of said school district at a special election held on November 20, 1961, for the purpose of defraying the cost of erecting, furnishing and equipping a new Junior High School building, one new elementary school building, an additional special building, and additions to the Barnum Junior High School building and the Franklin and Bloomfield Elementary School buildings, making other permanent improvements to school buildings and sites, and acquiring school sites and additions to school sites, all in said school district. The bonds will be the general obligations of the school district, which is authorized and required by law to levy upon all the taxable property therein such ad valorem taxes as may be necessary to pay said bonds, and the interest thereon, said tax levies being without limitation as to rate or amount as provided in Section 27, Article X, of the Michigan Constitution.

For the purpose of awarding the bonds, the interest cost resulting from each bid will be computed by determining, at the rate or rates specified in such bid, the total dollar value of all interest on the bonds from March 1, 1962 to their respective maturities and deducting therefrom any premium. The bonds will be awarded to the bidder whose bid on the above computation program shows the lowest net interest cost to the school district. No proposal for the purchase of less than all of the bonds or at a price less than their par value will be considered. Bidders are requested to state, for the information of the school district, the net interest cost in dollars and average rate as above computed in accordance with the terms of their proposal.

A certified or cashier's check in the amount of \$50,000, drawn upon an incorporated bank or trust company and payable to the order of the Treasurer of the school district, must accompany each bid as a guarantee of good faith. Bids not accompanied by such check will be forfeited as liquidated damages if such accepted and the bidder fails to take up and pay for said bonds. No interest shall be allowed on the good faith checks and checks of unsuccessful bidders will be promptly returned to each bidder's representative or by registered mail.

Bids shall be conditioned upon the unqualified opinion of Dickenson, Wright, McKee & Cudlip (Claude H. Stevens of Counsel), attorneys, Detroit, Michigan, approving the legality of the bonds. The cost of said legal opinion and of the printing of the bonds will be paid by the school district. There will also be furnished the usual closing documents, including a signature and non-litigation certificate, dated as of the date of delivery of the bonds. Bonds will be delivered at Chicago, Illinois, or New York, N. Y., at the option of the purchaser.

The right is reserved to reject any or all bids.

Envelopes containing the bids should be plainly marked "Proposals for Bonds".
