SOUTHFIELD—Construction bids on the \$850,000 Southfield Storm Drain project will be taken by the Oakland County Drain Commission from now until Feb. 17. The announcement was made by County Drain Commissioner Daniel W. Barry, last week.

The 6,745-foot relief drain, will extend north on the west side of Southfield Road in Southfield as far as Bonelle Street. It will connect into the Eight Mile Road Drain, now under construction.

Completion of both rain drains is expected by about January, 1963.

A joint city, county and state financed project, the Southfield Storm drain was approved at a public hearing Jan. 15.

Cost to Southfield will be \$500,000; the state Highway Department will pay \$300,000 and the county \$50,000.

Southfield had previously changed its mind four times over a five-month period on participation in the program, finally decided to share in the project in November. The city council has yet to decide how to raise its share of the cost.

A TOTAL 5,385 feet will be tunneled and pass under Northwestern Highway. Average cost per foot of the total project will be about \$132.

Construction bids on the Southfield drain will be held firm after being let for 90 days while the bond issue awaits Municipal Finance Commission approval, according to Barry.
