Three prominent Michigan businessmen have been named by the trustees of Maryglade College, founded in October, 1960, at Memphis, Mich., under direction of the P. M. E. Mission at Cobo Hall on Des. 1, Saints Peter and Paul.

De Lorenzo is of the Catholic faith; Lurie, Jewish; and Bentley a Protestant.

At Maryglade, young American men are sought for volunteer work in religious, educational, medical and social fields in underdeveloped areas.

The Rev. Father Nicholas Maestri, P. M. E., Maryglade president, points out that graduates go to work on a volunteer basis wherever the need is greatest to relieve human suffering. They direct their efforts to people of all races, color or creed in remote outposts of the world.

The College is conducted by the Pontifical Institute for Mission Extension (PIME) which has been in existence for 110 years.

VILLAGE OF BEVERLY HILLS ORDINANCE NO. 60

AN ORDINANCE TO REGULATE OR PROHIBIT THE FILING OF LAND WITHIN THE VILLAGE OF BEVERLY HILLS; TO PRESCRIBE RULES, REGULATIONS AND CONDITIONS FOR THE ISSUANCE OF PERMITS OR LICENSES FOR SAME, AND TO PROVIDE PENALTIES FOR VIOLATION THEREOF.

The Village of Beverly Hills Ordinance:

Section 1.01. The Village of Beverly Hills hereby declares that it is necessary to provide and establish regulations and conditions governing the filing of land within the village in order to protect the public health, safety and welfare.

Section 2.01. The filling of land with garbage or any other all waste particles of animals, fruit or vegetable matter incident to the use, preparation and storage of food for human consumption.

Section 3.01. It shall be unlawful for and after the effective date of this Ordinance for any person, firm, partnership, association, company or corporation to conduct any filing, dumping, depositing, transporting or disposal of refuse, rubbish or garbage, whether household, commercial, industrial or otherwise, upon lands or premises within said Village, without first having obtained a license as hereinafter provided and also as provided in Ordinance No. 52.

Section 4.01. It shall be unlawful for any person, firm, or corporation, from and after the effective date of this Ordinance, to allow any garbage, or any material which is commonly classified as waste, rubbish or junk to collect or pile up on any property which he or it owns, occupies or controls, in such a manner that it attracts flies, insects, or rodents, emits offensive odors, or otherwise interferes with the safety, health or welfare of the public.

Section 5.01. Application for license hereunder shall be made to the Village Clerk and shall be in writing and shall contain the following information:

- Name, residence, telephone and business address of the applicant.
- Name, address and telephone number of the owner of the land or premises involved.
- The full description of the land or premises upon which the filing, dumping, depositing or disposal is to take place.
- The kind of business applicant was previously engaged in, the place or places where and the length of time the same was conducted.
- The exact purpose for which license is desired including operation or activity intended, extent and scope thereof, contracts or agreements involved, and length of time operation or activity will consume.
- The number, license number and description of all motor vehicles and of all other equipment or facilities intended to be used and the places where the same is presently located.
- The financial status of applicant relating to the ability to fulfill duties in the operation activity.
- Any and all other information that may be required at the time the Village Director or Public Safety Officer determines the ability and qualifications of applicant to conduct such business in compliance with the ordinance of the Village, State and Federal regulations, and in such manner as will not be deleterious to public health, safety and welfare, and so as not to create a public or private nuisance.
- Said application shall contain an agreement by applicant to obey, abide by and comply with all of the provisions of this Ordinance, all health requirements, and all other ordinances, rules and regulations applicable to the conduct of said business, now in force or which may hereafter be adopted.

Section 6.01. There shall be filed with such applications, if involving any filing, dumping, depositing or disposal other than minor or small fills, a map of the premises under consideration showing contour lines of at least the lowest and highest elevation before any filing, dumping, depositing or disposal, and lines resulting from such filing or depositing in relation to the topography of the premises and existing public roads or easements, and also information as to the nature and kind of soil on the premises before depositing and filing and nature, kind and quantity of soil available from the premises or elsewhere for covering the compacted surface as required by this Ordinance.

Section 6.02. Such map shall show existing drains, streams and water sources that course through or arise within the property. All drains, streams, springs or other water sources shall be enclosed, diverted, channeled or otherwise controlled as approved by the Village Manager. All ditches, and natural or constructed drains shall be protected and separated from the compacted material of the sanitary land fill at least fifteen (15) feet of earth in such a manner that the drain or ditch cannot drain into nor out of the compacted material. Roadside ditches will not be disrupted nor disturbed.

Section 7.01. That upon filing such applications and information thereon shall be paid to the Village Clerk a license fee based upon the estimate of the Village Manager and or Village Engineer, of the actual cost of such plans and information, according to the following schedule:

- \$8.00 per hour for each hour work of Village Engineer.
- \$4.00 per hour for each hour of work of each engineering or health department aid.
- In addition to the basic license fee which follows:
 - The sum of Twenty Five (\$25.00) Dollars for five (5) acres of the sanitary landfill area or less.
 - The sum of Fifty (\$50.00) Dollars for an area from five (5) acres to ten (10) acres of sanitary landfill.
 - The sum of Seventy Five (\$75.00) Dollars for an area from ten (10) acres to twenty (20) acres of sanitary landfill.
 - The sum of One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars for an area of more than twenty (20) acres of sanitary landfill. A license fee of Twenty (\$20.00) Dollars shall be charged for each trailer unit transporting sanitary material as described in this Ordinance upon the public streets or highways within the Boundaries of this municipality.

Section 8.01. That any license issued hereunder shall include provision requiring inspections by or in behalf of the Village at least once a month and in the judgment of the Village Manager, Village Engineer or Health Officer, it is necessary to protect the public health, safety and welfare. For such additional inspections there shall be charged a fee for the actual cost thereof based on hourly rate of \$4.00 per hour and also at \$8.00 per hour if Engineer's services are required.

CRANBROOK VILLAGE — A barn, used to house tools owned by Lockwood Construction Co., burned to the ground last week on Tuesday, July 2, at 12 Mile Road near Southfield.

Two fire trucks extinguished the fire. Cranbrook subdivision is in the Southfield Fire Department area.

THE AUXILIARY staff on the ship is supplied by the surrounding communities. In the operating room we have one Peruvian aide and two orderlies. They are all very hard and very willing workers.

On this rotation shift of doctors is Dr. Irwin Small, who practices oral surgery in Birmingham. He has been very busy since he arrived teaching and working with the dentists in the area, as well as the medical students from the University of Trujillo.

VILLAGE OF BEVERLY HILLS ORDINANCE NO. 61

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND ORDINANCE NO. 29 ENTITLED "AN ORDINANCE REGULATING AND RESTRICTING THE HEIGHT, NUMBER OF STORIES AND SIZE OF BUILDINGS; THE SIZE OF OPEN SPACES; THE DENSITY OF POPULATION; THE LOCATION AND USE OF BUILDINGS AND LAND FOR TRADE, RESIDENCE AND OTHER PURPOSES; CREATING DISTRICTS FOR SAID PURPOSES AND ESTABLISHING THE BOUNDARIES THEREOF; PROVIDING FOR CHANGES IN REGULATIONS, RESTRICTIONS, AND REZONING OF SUCH DISTRICTS; DEFINING CERTAIN TERMS USED HEREIN; PROVIDING FOR ENFORCEMENT; ESTABLISHMENT OF A ZONING BOARD OF APPEALS; AND IMPOSING PENALTIES FOR THE VIOLATION OF THIS ORDINANCE."

The Village of Beverly Hills Ordinance:

Section 1.01. That Ordinance No. 29 entitled "An Ordinance Regulating and Restricting the Height, Number of Stories and Size of Buildings; the Size of Open Spaces; the Density of Population; the Location and Use of Buildings and Land for Trade, Residence and Other Purposes; Creating Districts for said Purposes and Establishing the Boundaries Thereof; Providing for Changes in Regulations and Boundaries of Such Districts; Defining Certain Terms Used Herein; Providing for Enforcement; Establishment of a Zoning Board of Appeals; and Imposing Penalties for the Violation of this Ordinance" and the same hereby is amended by amending the Zone Map attached thereto and made a part thereof as follows:

A. That the following described property is changed from Single Family Residential 2 (R-2) zone use to Single Family Residential 2 (R-3) zone use:

- Lots 201 thru 212, both inclusive, and Lots 215 thru 225, both inclusive, of James L. Todd and Leinbach-Humphrey's Indian Village Subdivision.

B. That the following described property is changed from Single Family Residential 2 (R-2) zone use to Single Family Residential 2 (R-3) zone use:

- Lots 169 thru 173, both inclusive, Lots 194 thru 200, both inclusive, all that part of Lots 174 and 193 lying Easterly of a line lying 300.00 feet West of and parallel to Madison Avenue, as now established, and all that part of vacated public alley, 20 feet wide lying therein, of James L. Todd and Leinbach-Humphrey's Indian Village Subdivision.

C. That the following described property is changed from Single Family Residential 2 (R-2) zone use to Public Property (PP) zone use:

- Lots 175 thru 184, both inclusive, Lots 189 thru 192, both inclusive, all that part of Lots 174 and 193 lying West of a line lying 300.00 feet West of and parallel to Madison Avenue, as now established, and all of the vacated public alley, 20 feet wide lying therein, of James L. Todd and Leinbach-Humphrey's Indian Village Subdivision.

Section 2.01. Public hearing having been held hereon July 2, 1962, and the statutory notices having been published and mailed, the provisions of this Ordinance are hereby declared to be immediately in force for the preservation of public health, safety and hereby ordered to take effect immediately upon publication.

Made and passed by the Village Council of the Village of Beverly Hills, on the 2nd day of July, 1962.
