For Mrs. and Mrs. G. L. Telfer, it was their way of doing a good turn as they said "goodbye" to the community.

The Telfers of 780 Greenwood, Birmingham, closed the doors of their Cheer Shop at 191 S. Woodward, for the last time Sat. June 25.

THAT MONDAY they carried on with preparations for retiring to their home in Ocean Ridge, Florida. Their first project was to distribute toys and children's clothes left unsold after their final day of shop-keeping.

There was enough left to supply a calendar full of Birmingham-Bloomfield Hills birthday parties with Sunday best dresses, tantalizing toys and suits for well-groomed young men.

The Telfers could have chosen to sell everything out. Instead, they remembered the charitable projects which mothers of their young customers had told them about.

THEY SENT baby clothes to The Christ Child Society, items for certain age groups to The American Field Service and the mentally retarded children at Pontiac State Hospital.

They remembered that Mrs. Ben D. Mills, head of the Women's Committee for Camp Oakland, had told them about the Oxford, Michigan camp where young wards of the court are given a home at Girls' Ranch and Boys' Ranch.

So on Monday of last week, the Telfers called Camp Oakland, saying they had some clothing and books they wished to give to the children.

The news spread around Girls' Ranch and Boys' Ranch faster than a bulletin from Associated Press. Among the most excited was Christmas when house mother Maxine Hamilton drove off with the camp's truck station wagon to pick up the gifts.

WITH HER went Kathie, 14 years old and a tall, pretty blond. Said Telfer afterwards, "Kathie had a nice way of message for us. She was well-dressed, and just as sweet as could be."

"We couldn't help but recognize that the children are getting some wonderful training and care out of Camp Oakland," said Telfer. "It's that kind of thing that we like to support."

Kathie and Mrs. Hamilton got a big welcome from everyone when they returned to Camp Oakland.

Excited children found the big station wagon loaded with 47 hats, 30 bathing suits, five dozen blouses, two dozen skirts, raincoats, sweaters, blazers, slacks, shorts, ties, belts, slippers, books and toys.

IT WAS a real boost for Director William J. Matus, the head of the big Camp Oakland family of 36. "Like kids everywhere, these kids are clothes-conscious," said Matus, "—especially the girls. They read the magazines about Ben Casey blouses and all these nice things they want to buy—that I can't afford."

"There was plenty to go around," said Matus. "So everybody was happy."

And the beauty of the words, "it is better to give than to receive" became clear to the Telfers. They were happiest of all.

ative loans with high onset rates over periods of time longer than previously investigated," Hafstad said.

"Once the natural limitations have been established and problem areas identified, artificial means or techniques for extending the natural limitations may be investigated."

"Manned spacecraft systems, or subsystems, can then be designed around better-known human capabilities, rather than presumed human limitations."

UP TO THE present, approximately 80 G's has been the highest load that man has been subjected to on an impact accelerator at the Goddard Air Force Base, Alamogordo, N. Mex., Hafstad said. However, on rotating accelerators, 25 to 30 G's has been sustained for longer periods.

HERB RECIPE OF THE WEEK—Branwick Stew: 1-1/2 lb. chicken, 2 tsp bacon fat, 3 medium onions sliced, 1 tsp Worcestershire sauce, 1 cup cherry wine, 1 lb. can Italian peeled tomatoes, 1 tsp thyme, 1/2 cup finely cut parsley, 1 pk. frozen whole kernel corn, 3 pk. frozen French-style green beans, 1/2 cup salt and pepper to taste. Cut chicken up in pieces, cook until tender and remove from broiler. Drain tomatoes and onion in hot water. Add to chicken. Cover with the broth and add Worcestershire sauce, cherry, thyme, thyme, parsley, salt and pepper. Simmer for about 1 hour. Then add vegetables and simmer until potatoes are done.
