Reader Wants Warning Sign Near Crossing

To the Editor:

In reply to Mrs. REV's letter in the June 21 issue of The Excitior, she mentions that something should be done about the Woodward-Long Lake Road crossing.

Something wonderful has already been done but I dare say that perhaps only about 10 per cent of the motorists know the full meaning of it.

The highway department installed blinker lights on top of the hill quite a way back from the spotlight. These are not just plain blinker lights that are on all the time.

WHEN YOU ARE approaching these signs and the lights begin to blink it means that you can't make the green light at 45 or 50 MPH.

I've noticed motorists all around me at this point, when the lights are blinking, will barrel down on the green light only to be caught by the red light at high speeds, where it is almost impossible to stop.

You can imagine what a gravel truck could do in a case like this.

When the highway department installed those lights, they explained the whole thing in the paper. But how many thousands never bother to read such things.

THE BEST THING that could be done now is to put signs over these two signals that would light up simultaneously with the amber blinkers. It should read in big letters: "YOU CAN'T MAKE IT," or something to that effect.

In this way, more people will get to know the full meaning of these blinker lights on top of the hill.

If this little message will only prevent a dented fender, I'll be most grateful.

Old-Fashioned Ideas Hinder Arthritic Care

Two-thirds of Michigan's 528,000 arthritic victims are not getting the medical care they need, reports Duncan M. Laulday, executive director of the Michigan chapter of the Arthritis and Rheumatism Foundation. He cites old-fashioned ideas about the disease as the cause.

One of the most serious fallacies is the belief that medical science can do nothing about the widespread affliction.

In fact, Laulday says, seven out of ten arthritics sufferers can be restored to useful, active living if they get proper, proper medical treatment.

IMPORTANT of early diagnosis is stressed by Dr. James J. Lightbody, medical director of the Michigan A.R.F.

Treatment is usually a long-term proposition of individualized care, using drugs, rest, heat, exercise and other specialized methods. "Many do not know that such care can help," Dr. Lightbody says. "Another mistaken idea is held by those who consider arthritis a collection of mild aches and pains afflicting persons in their 60's and 70's."

Information about arthritis can be obtained through the Michigan A.R.F., an agency of the United Foundation, Torch Drive and the Michigan United Fund.

The chapter supports a continuing program for research, education and patient services. Literature available includes patient handbooks on rheumatoid arthritis, osteoarthritis and gout.

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
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
