Milky Way Sky Sight for July

The Milky Way, stretching from north to south, dominates the astronomical picture during July, says University of Michigan astronomer Hazel M. Losh.

"To the unaided eye, the Milky Way shines as a soft misty light, but slight optical assistance, even binoculars or a small telescope, shows it to be made up of myriads of faint stars and nebulae," Professor Losh notes.

"It bears many fanciful titles, but the idea of its being a pathway has been a very prevalent one, for it's easy to imagine it a starry path, a glistening river, or a heavenly snake, or according to an old Indian legend, dust kicked up by a buffalo and horse racing across the sky."

"TODAY IT IS believed to be a great concourse of stars, star clusters, bright nebulae, gas clouds, and dark dust clouds," the U-M astronomer explains.

"Its light is due almost entirely to stars, which are too faint to be distinguished as individuals with-

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BE WARY!

This season is a fooler because despite the late Spring both insect population and size of fruits are 10 to 14 days earlier than in previous season. Read on:—

Apple maggots cause lumps and brown streaks. Spray carefully with McCLELLAN-BALL or ACME FRUIT TREE SPRAY or TREE-TOX (a liquid).

For "lesser" peach borers in crotches and in cankers on larger limbs spray every two weeks if tree is bearing — on young non-bearing trees spray every week.

"Thin peaches so that fruits are 8 inches apart and remove all fruit from branches with no leaves.

Pears also should be thinned. Remove all but one in each cluster.

LECANIUM (SOFT BROWN) SCALES are in crawling stage on some trees. Spray fruit trees, ornamentals, shrubs, etc., with ISOTOX or SEVIN. Do it three times at 2 week intervals.

SAWDUST MULCH

Since sawdust extracts nitrogen from the soil this material is treated with Urea Nitrogen to offset this action.

Tomatoes, egg plants & vine crops need more fertilizer now. Punch 3 six-inch deep holes near each plant. Use 10-6-4, 10-10-10, or such. For tomatoes—one heaping tablespoonful in each hole. The others only a level tablespoonful.

Squash vine borer is controlled with McCLELLAN-BALL FRUIT TREE SPRAY or ROTENONE. Spray 4 times at one week intervals and concentrate on the first 3 feet of the vines.

Prune flowering shrubs now, or not at all. Late pruning develops new shoots that won't survive the winter. Also divide and reset oriental poppies, day lilies and irises.

For feeding we prefer AGRINITE (7-0-0), REGAL LAWN FOOD (5-4-0), or AGRICO U.F. (10-6-4). Stake the delphiniums, dahlias, etc., to protect them from damage from wind and storms.

ADJUST STAKES for bushy plants.

PLANT PROPS for stems.

BAMBOO for plants like snapdragons.
