

Birthday Round-Up Ready to Get Started

"Roundup, a good fellowship, service and cheer" . . . since November, this has been the theme for 24 Senior Girl Scouts from Southern Oakland Girl Scout Council who are training for the 50th Birthday Roundup at Button Bay, Vt., July 18 through July 31.

Divided into three Patrols, each eight-girl group researched into Michigan history, folklore and legends to find Patrol names and suitable demonstrations typical of Michigan.

Patrol A, including Marcia Doyal, Birmingham; Pat Graves, Birmingham; Barbara Newman, Oak Park; Gayle Hamilton Farmington; Jeanette Ruenski, Birmingham; Judy Covert, Farmington; Pat Bordini, Troy; and Marilyn Mason, Birmingham, selected the name "Filles Du Bois," "Girls of the Woods," to commemorate both the wood-rangering voyageurs and the lumbering era.

Dressed in their demonstration costumes of blue denim skirts, vivid bandana shirts and stocking caps, Patrol A will demonstrate making pop-hood wooden red cedar jewelry in intricate triangular shapes. The Patrol flag is green and white, emblazoned with a crosscut saw and axe.

Patrol B, the "Nain Rouge" Patrol, enchanted by the legendary dwarf who appeared to Cadillac, LaSalle and other Michigan French pioneers, chose the red gromme to represent them. Red from cap to toe, with long, slashed overblouses and red tights, they will present their demonstration of an animated elves' workshop producing buttons for Button Bay, led by Diane Frechette, Southfield, and Cheryl Griffin, Birmingham. Patrol C, inspired by the romance of Great Lakes sailing days, elected to call themselves the "Salty Eight." They will present an original revue in miniature on a mock-up of a ship's deck. Here they will sing and dance fresh-water ballads, dressed in authentic sailor's suits. Their Patrol flag features an anchor and sailor in 3-D.

Patrol C leaders are: Sandra Turf and Jackie Blong, Bloomfield; Pam Swain, Farmington; Wendy King, Birmingham; Patricia Markey, Farmington; Sharon Laws, Berkeley; Margaret Falcoviss, Berkeley and Dorothy Barr, Pleasant Ridge.

Participating in the same training as the Rounduppers, Patrol D will be attending the White Deer Encampment at three Lakes, Wis., where, dressed in country-style checked plights, aprons, they will make Michigan cherry tart, using a reflector oven. The emblematic animal of Michigan is the Wolverine, decorates Patrol D's flag. Beverly Williams, Troy, and Mary Richardson, Birmingham, are Patrol D leaders. Mary Ann Karr, Royal Oak; Barbara Barzell, Farmington; Teddy Brownlee, Royal Oak; Joanne Ylasko, Royal Oak; Mercedes MacLeivane, Farmington; Kathleen Block, Royal Oak and Kirkland Hall, Birmingham, complete Patrol D.

PURSUING THE Girl Scout program of career exploration, specialists in these fields have been selected. Sending the newspapers for photographic coverage of Roundup to accompany the stories are: Jung Covert, Roseanne Marshall

and Pat Markey, Barbara Newman, Martha MacCleery and Wendy King will prepare a complete Roundup story on slides. Radio correspondents are Gayle Hamilton and Margaret Kassner.

The role of the adult trainers in Roundup preparations has been purely advisory. The girls, through their Patrol leaders and Court of Honor have planned, produced and perfected every facet of the Southern Oakland Girl Scout Council Roundup Program. Meal planning, shopping, costume designing, primitive camping and cooking and choreography are only a part of the skills perfected by the Roundup Patrols during the training period.
