

Township Physician Has Active Role In Cancer Meeting

Dr. and Mrs. Harry M. Nelson, 1607 Kirkway, Bloomfield Township, will attend the eighth International Cancer Congress in Moscow from July 22 to 28.

They are among numerous representatives of the Southeastern Michigan Division of the American Cancer Society who will travel on the "Clipper Conquer Cancer," a jetliner, to attend the meeting.

DR. NELSON, chief gynecologist at Women's Hospital, Detroit, will present a paper on "Advancing the Worldwide Fight Against Cancer." Dr. Nelson, who is chairman of the Committee to Advance the Worldwide Fight Against Cancer and former president of the American Cancer Society, will be among leaders of the society's contingent of 225 volunteers and staff to attend the Moscow meeting.

THE AMERICAN Cancer Society will have an exhibit at the congress and will show four educational films. The society has prepared a special publication in its purpose and functions which will be distributed in Russian, French and English.

More than 1,000 papers on all aspects of cancer control and research will be presented at the congress, which will be attended by some 4,500 scientists and leaders in the fight against cancer from more than 60 countries.

Publishing Industry Offers Opportunities To Small Business

The printing and publishing industry could offer excellent opportunities for small businessmen in the years ahead, according to two Michigan State University graduate students. C. F. VanTassel and P. J. Keegan found that employment in printing and publishing between 1950 and 1960 grew at more than twice the rate for manufacturing as a whole, with about 80 per cent of the firms employing fewer than

20 persons. "As the population growth continues, the dependence on printed and published material should result in a continued expansion of the industry," the report said.

"AT THE SAME time, it is unlikely that the smaller operators will be forced out of the competitive picture because there is and will continue to be a strong demand for small-scale printing services. The larger firms are not usually in a position to satisfy this type of demand because they use high-speed equipment that is most efficient for long runs."



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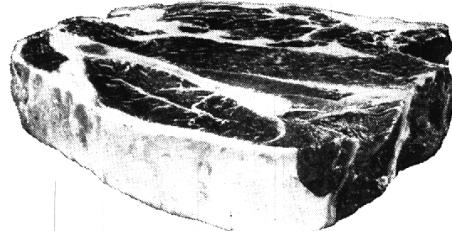

Keep Foods Cool To Help Prevent Food Poisoning

Food poisoning can spoil many outings and vacations this summer, warns Dr. John D. Monroe, director of the Oakland County Department of Health. Health authorities estimate there are as many as 1,000,000 cases of food poisoning each year in the United States which could be prevented.

The most frequent cause of food poisoning is failure to keep foods properly refrigerated in warm weather, Monroe said. This applies to cooked as well as uncooked foods.

UNITED STATES Public Health Service scientists have shown that bacteria commonly causing food poisoning will grow and multiply in foods at temperatures as low as 42° F. Perishable foods should therefore be stored at no higher than 40° F., they say.

In addition to poultry and meat, particularly processed meats, foods most commonly affected are fish, custards and cream-filled pastries. Although highly distressing, food poisoning is usually not serious and seldom fatal. At the first sign, which is usually sudden, should call a doctor and if possible go to bed.

Littering Mar's State's Beauty

A proclamation urging Michigan citizens and tourists from other states to support the Keep Michigan Beautiful program was issued by Gov. John B. Swainson.

Swainson, who designated July and August as "Anti-Litter Season," said it costs Michigan taxpayers an estimated \$1 million a year to clean up trash from public places—"an unnecessary expense which can be eliminated through the cooperation of Michigan residents."

"Each citizen of Michigan has an interest in our State and its well-being," the proclamation said. "Our great outdoors deserves the same consideration we give our personal property. Thoughtlessness in disposing of waste can mar the beauty of Michigan."

THE GOVERNOR said Michigan's "unsurpassed" scenic beauty is one of the state's greatest assets and a magnet which attracts hundreds of thousands of visitors from other states.

The state's tourist industry, which provides thousands of jobs for Michigan citizens, is a direct beneficiary of efforts to keep Michigan beautiful, he said.
