Open to both beginners and advanced seamstresses, the 1 to 4 p.m. Thursday and Friday class sessions will cover 18 hours of

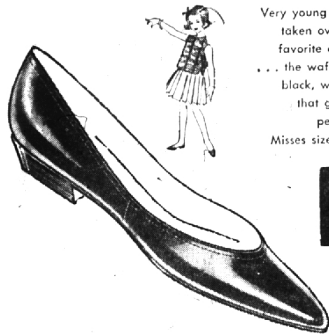

Advanced Patterns, has taught sewing to women of all ages and levels of skill in 22 years of classes, including the Detroit Board of Education Adult program and at Detroit "YW" branches.
