

Recreation Round-Up

PLAYGROUNDS

All children between the ages of 10 and 15 who wish to participate in the Detroit Metropolitan Youth Fitness Meet should register this week at one of the playground locations. A city-wide playground olympics meet will be held at Pierce Field next Tuesday from 9 a.m. to 12 noon and winners in all events will participate at Belle Isle with 55 other cities on Thursday, July 26.

All Birmingham winners will be chartered bus to Belle Isle and will remain after the meet for picnicking, swimming and other events. For more information ask the playground leaders at one of the following sites—Adams School, Midvale, Quanton, Pierce and Terry Schools and at Pomrore Park.

THE CRAFT project on the playgrounds this week is leather work including lanyards, bracelets, coin purses and scran leather projects. All children in the right-hand, puppetry and baton classes are preparing for the all-city competition night to be held at Eton Park on August 1.

DAMP CAMP

the articles and laws in playing at golf as set forth at the Links of Leith in 1744.

THERE IS also a colored reproduction of Sir Henry Raeburn and Sir John Watson Gordon's famous painting of John Taylor, Esq., known captain of the oldest documented golf society, The Honourable, The Edinburgh Company of Golfers, in typical gaffer's garb of the early 1800's; and some fine examples of old golf balls and mallets.

The interest of White Horse Distillers, Ltd. in "the royal and ancient game of golf" stems from its early association with the celebrated White Horse Gellar coaching inn in Edinburgh, Scotland.

CONVENIENT to both the Palace of Holyroodhouse and the famous Links of Leith, the White Horse represented to the early Edinburgh golfer that which we affectionately call today, "the 19th hole."

And it was at the White Horse, during the winter of 1743, "that several Gentlemen of honor, skillful in the ancient and healthful exercise of golf," met to prepare the Articles and Conditions for the first open championship—open to "Noblemen, Gentlemen, or other golfers, from any part of Great Britain or Ireland."

AMONG THE ancient and curious to be seen at Eton Park is a brassie, circa 1880, by Alexander Patrick of Linn Links, Scotland—one of the great club-makers of the late Nineteenth century. Brass shod woods are reputed to have originated at Blackheath where the gravely links raised havoc with the soles of clubs.

The exhibit also contains a Spalding "Morrilstown" driver, circa 1890-1900; a play club (driver), circa 1875, by "Bob" Simpson of Carnoustie—considered the "most artistic club-maker" of the late Nineteenth century; and a mallet, circa 1880, by Douglas McEwan of Leith and Musselburgh—the "Heppelwhite" of club-making and a Spalding's mallet or No. 2 iron with scoring, circa 1900.

Golfing curios for the collection were obtained through the cooperation of private collectors both here and abroad and the Robert Forgan Golf Museum at St. Andrews, Scotland.

row might after 72 holes the field will be cut to 16.

Match play begins Saturday with 18 holes scheduled in the morning for the 16 to determine the eight quarterfinalists scheduled for 18 holes in the afternoon; to determine the four semifinalists.

Match play continues Sunday with 18 holes scheduled for the semifinalists in the morning and the real championships 18 holes scheduled for the two finalists in the afternoon.

TOMMY SHANNON, Orchard Lake's pro and the expert on the course, last night reiterated his opinion that the leader of the 16 entrants who survive the first 72 holes, all stroke play, should come in with perhaps a total score of 281, seven strokes under the 288 par.

"Orchard Lake's in remarkable condition right now compared to many of the courses in this region," he explained. "The winter kill was severe but Orchard Lake escaped heavy damage and has made a remarkable comeback."

The ultimate beneficiaries of the 60th Western Amateur gate receipt will be some 450 Chick Evans Scholars, about 110 of them from Michigan, supported with full-tuition and full-housing scholarships on campuses when the colleges open in September.

RECEIPTS, less basic expenses and the host club's share, all go to the WGA and after minimal expenses then to the WGA's Chick Evans Scholars Foundation established 32 years ago. WGA's officers, directors and trustees serve without pay and annually present not only the Western Amateur but the Western Open, which closed at Chicago July 1, and the Western Junior, which will be played Aug. 7-11 at Minneapolis.

Chick Evans, the famous golfer, established the Foundation and is still active in it. Purpose of the Foundation is to provide college scholarships for deserving cadettes.

EVANS scholarships already awarded nationally will total more than 1,350 by September. Eligibility is simple: Cadettes who are in the top 25 per cent of their high school classes and need financial help can qualify.

The scholarships were supported last year through WGA member clubs by 42,000 golfers, 8,400 of them in Michigan. Michigan's contributions go to the James D. Standish Jr. Scholarship Fund, an affiliate of the Evans Foundation.

Michigan has presented more Evans caddie scholarships than any other state—283 since the Standish fund was created 14 years ago.
